THE WOOL MARKET.

There is nothing new in the wool market. Prices are nominal, many large wool growers having placed their stock in the hands of commission merchants, and the trade stands still to wait what manufacturers will do. As with wheat, so with wool last year. Speculation carried prices so high that a reaction has taken place and was very natural under the circumstances and prices have dropped as much too low as they were once too high. This is no new phenomenon in trade and has occurred so often that shrewd men can predict its occurrence.

The New York Economist has conceded much in late issues from its determined position that the wool supply and demand would carry prices higher, and confesses that California wools opened at an unreasonably high figure. Its conclusions may be correct, but if the facts stated as to demand and supply are correct there is no reason why wool should not improve as the season advances and the needs of manufacturers become more evident. At present they keep the market down by refusing to purchase the new clip except at their own figures, and they are sure, for while at least, for there is an immense supply soon to be on hand; but when they come, at a later period, to compete for their Fall and Winter stocks, prices must certainly be better sustained.

There seems nothing better to be said than to repeat the facts weekly and give wool growers sufficient information upon which to base their action. It looks as if to sell now would be to lose a good prospect for an improving market; but every man can judge that for himself.

WORK ON MISSING CLAIMS.—Congressman Daggett, of Nevada, having been appointed by some of his constituents as to the propriety of introducing a new law regulating work on missing claims, answers as follows: After consultation with the Land Commissioner, I find that he has formerly conceded that the work on a claim may be done at any time within the 12 months beginning with the 1st of January after the location has been made. Consequently locators have an entire year, together with the portion of the year preceding the 1st of January, following the location to do their first annual work.

Hence, a claim located now, May 15, 1880, would hold without work until January 1, 1881; but some time between January 1, 1881, and January 1, 1882, the work must be done. This is the interpretation given by the Attorney-General, and may be accepted as the law.

NEWSPAPER WORK.—Newspaper work is remorseless in its requirements and exigent in its demands. In the matter of permanent remuneration it is scarcely rewarded. The same steady industry which is expended in the treatment of topics of evanescent interest and of temporary importance, if employed in another direction, might result in the production of remarkable books, with a respectable place in literary annals.

The staff of a newspaper is there as a clerk, as a professor is in his recitation room, as a doctor is at the bedside of the sick, as a lawyer is in the tribunal of justice. None of these need knowledge and tact more than he does, and upon equitable estimation, few of them possess more of either than himself.
