INSTRUCTIONS TO REGISTERS AND RECEIVERS.

WASHINGTON, July 9th.—Commissioner William Wallace of the General Land Office has today issued a series of detailed instructions to all Registers and Receivers, which prescribe the regulations necessary to carry into effect the law enacted at the last session of Congress for refunding all excess in the payment of ordinary purchase money, fee, and commission on void entries of public lands. The Act affects thousands of settlers throughout the Western States and Territories. The first section authorizes the repayment to the present parties of the fees and commissions paid by them on entries of fraudulent soldiers' and sailors' additional homestead scrip, of which very large quantities were forged and set off in the Western States some years ago. Commissioner William Wallace's instructions require a thorough proof of the bona fides of the applicant for relief under this section. The second section provides for the repayment of the purchase money and of fees, commissions and excess payments in all cases where the entries of public lands have been canceled for conflict, or where from any cause the entry has been erroneously allowed by the local Land Offices, and cannot be confirmed; also for refunding the extra \$1 25 per acre paid by pre-emption settlers for lands subject to the double minimum lands, within railroad limits, but afterwards discovered to be outside of such limits, and therefore purchasable at the ordinary minimum thereof, \$1 25 per acre. All these repayments may be made to the party who made the original entry, or to his heirs, executors or administrators, or to an assignee specially authorized to receive such payment; but a mere conveyance of the land will not be deemed to carry with it the right to repayment, unless expressly so stated in the assignment. Where there has been a conveyance of the land, and the original purchaser applies for repayment, he must conclusively show that he has indemnified his assignee or perfected the title in him through another source. Assignees of the title to land must show by affidavit or otherwise that they have not been indemnified by their grantors for the failure of such title, and the title has not been perfected in them by grantors through another source. Where there is a specific assignment of the purchase money, evidence of non-indemnification by the grantor is not required. In the case of the purchase money are the only assignees recognized. All applications for repayment are to be transmitted, together with all papers in the case, to the Commissioner of the General Land Office through the Registers and Receivers of the proper districts, who are required to make due report on each case transmitted, and the money finally found due will be paid out of the Treasury upon the warrant of the Secretary of the Interior.

GRAND LODGE A. O. U. W.—The Grand Lodge of the Ancient Order of United Workmen convened at Astoria on the 24th ult. There was some important work done by the lodge and several changes were made in the secret signs and also in the work of bestowing of the degrees. The second degree, or S. W., has been entirely done away with and now an applicant receives only the two degrees. From the California papers we learn that the lodges in that state made a similar change some time ago. The different committees have also new duties to perform, and the principal officers of the lodges will be required to be perfectly familiar with all the changes and work before they can occupy their offices. All this has been done in California and other places where the order is strong and has a large membership. At Astoria the Grand Lodge of the Ancient Order of United Workmen, under the leadership of W. Case, President, twenty-six lodges were represented and there were forty-six delegates in attendance. Lodge officers were elected: F. G. Abell, Portland, G. M. White, O. G. Roof, Seattle, G. E. Dr. J. M. E. Brown, Roseburg, G. G. W. S. White, Portland, Grand Recorder; I. B. Moores, Salem, Grand Receiver; J. P. Goodline, Victoria, B. C. G. G. G. E. Nottage, East Portland, G. W.; S. W. Waughop, Olympia, Grand Trustee; I. W. Case, East G. M. W.

One thing is certain, and that is if Roseburg expects to keep the Jackson county trade, or Portland the trade of the merchants, the road south from here must be made passable and good.—Roseburg Star.

GREEK MEETS GREEK.—Governor Whitaker and M. C. George met at Laid & Tilton's bank yesterday and shook hands with genuine cordiality. The honest old Governor congratulated his successor very heartily, and assured him that he had spoken many kind words in his behalf at Washington, and could faithfully assure him of a pleasant reception at the Capitol. This is as it ought to be. Devotion to the best interests of Oregon should ever crowd out of sight any bitterness of feeling that an exciting campaign may have engendered.—Standard.

IS A RECENT CASE in the Superior Court of Nevada county, involving the question as to whether a Chinaman can convey title to mining ground, Judge Caldwell decided that under the Revised Statutes of the United States an alien cannot hold, by occupation or otherwise, mineral land, multiple to patenting.

MULE TRAINS are passing into the Skagit pines by the Hope route. The trains are reported in good order, and as soon as the water goes down, a rush is expected.

LETTER FROM WASHINGTON.

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 7, 1880. Senator Wallace is to be made Chairman of the Democratic Committee. It has been decided to have the headquarters of the National Democratic Committee at New York, and headquarters of the Congressional Committee here. Indications now point to the selection of Senator Wallace as chairman of the National Committee. Ex-Senator Barnum has no desire to occupy such a position, and his mantle could descend to no other shoulders than those of Senator Wallace. The latter gentleman is not a member of the Committee, but Mr. Scott of Pa. is anxious to resign so that the Senator can be appointed in his place on the Committee. His name eligible to the Chairmanship. While here, a few days ago, Senator Wallace expressed his firm belief that Pennsylvania would wheel into the ranks of the Democracy and give a greater loyal son a rousing majority in November.

DECAPITATION. The little "hatchet" of some of the heads of the departments has commenced its work in chopping off the official heads of the new Democratic party that are now employed. Yesterday some five or six clerks were discharged from the War Department because they were too enthusiastic for their old leader, Hancock, and more will follow.

IN A FORMER LETTER I stated that Green B. Raun, Commissioner of Internal Revenue, would be invited to step down and out. I will have to take a portion of it back. Instead of being turned out, he has been shorn of all his patronage. He has been shorn of his patronage. He has sufficient courage, when his backbone is stiffened by his stalwart friends, to veto a Democratic measure; but has not stamina enough to remove a stalwart head. But when Secretary Sherman became a name, the Hayes would not remove Raun, he concluded to make Raun's office hot for him during the present administration at least. So yesterday, issued the following order: "On and after July 1st, 1880, any application for appointment by name of a ranger, storekeeper, storekeeper and gauger, or inspector of tobacco, in the Internal Revenue service will be made to the Secretary of the Treasury, and each case will be in the handwriting of the applicant and signed by him, stating his age, legal residence, where born, and the service in the Army or Navy if any. The application must be accompanied by testimonials as to character or sobriety, industry, and business habits. Collectors of internal revenue will report to the Secretary of the Treasury, whenever the necessities of the service require, new appointments or removals of incumbents, giving the reasons therefor, and forwarding to this office the papers in each case. Removal from office of any of the named officers will hereafter be made only by the Secretary of the Treasury."

SECRETARY SHERMAN followed the order, up by revoking the appointment of a number of Clerks in the Department who had been employed by name. The order virtually reduces Raun to the level of a Chief Clerk now that all this immense patronage is taken from him. Things are not altogether lovely and serene in the Stalwart Camp; and this is but the outcroppings of greater dissonance that will speedily follow.
