GENERAL NOTES AND NEWS.

It is thought that Gen. Schofield will be ordered to California. The debt statement shows the decrease of the public debt during November to be \$3,609,261.

The tea crop of India this year is estimated at 70,000,000 pounds—nearly double the yield of 1878. The Ways and Means Committee now talk of refunding the national debt at 3 to 3 1/2 per cent. interest.

It is thought that the gold yield at Cassiar this year will reach \$250,000. Over 250 men will winter at the mines. Senator Grover is convalescent and is now at Washington. Republican reporters, however, appear anxious to have Lamar die.

The New York Herald speaks of several Chinamen voting in New York, and adds that they uniformly voted the Republican ticket. The Land-Loggers of New York and Brooklyn are considering the advisability of sending Ben Butler to Ireland to defend Parnell.

The House ordered printed the refunding bill, interest and commerce bills and a joint resolution for a six-year Presidential term. Kansas adopted the amendment to the Constitution prohibiting the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors by 20,000 majority.

The friends of Senator Lamar apprehend that his health will not permit his attendance in the Senate again. He is said to be very feeble. It is currently reported that General Howard will take charge of West Point. His well known friendly feelings for the negroes will make him acceptable.

In the next Assembly of Nevada out of fifty members there will be seven Republicans—three from Eureka, three from Ormsby, and one from Lander. The English cabinet holds together, but several members are reported as firmly opposed to coercion in Ireland, and others wish to suspend the habeas corpus act.

The Democrats on this Coast gained two-thirds of the States, one Senator and one Representative. Well done for the Pacific Coast. It will be held next time. Governor Foster of Ohio says General Garfield will make no speciality of Civil Service reform in his administration, and will see that all the offices go to the Republicans. Nobody expects anything else.

San Francisco, Dec. 7th.—Gen. Wm. B. Hazen has been appointed Chief Signal Officer. Gen. Ord has been put on the retired list. Gen. Angur takes command of the Department of Texas, vice Ord.

Are the Southern States now in a prosperous condition? We answer by stating that the cotton yield this year was over 6,000,000 bales, and the export of cotton-seed oil alone will exceed 120,000 barrels.

The report that Gen. Garfield will offer John Sherman the Treasury Department, and that the offer will be accepted, comes in such a way that it is entitled to more credence than is due to most political gossip.

The Chicago "Tribune" says that nothing like the prosperity now prevailing was ever known there. Store-rooms is not to be had, dwellings are all taken, and every new building is engaged before it is completed.

The Albany penitentiary during the last Democratic administration in New York yielded a revenue to the State of \$75,000. Under the virtuous Cornell, it has yielded the pitiful sum of \$1,000. How is that for reform!

Flood, the California millionaire, is reported to have made overtures to the Democrats in the Legislature if they will make him their caucus nominee he will be elected. The Republicans have about six majority on joint ballot.

The latest from New York is to the import that the electric light has been greatly improved—so much improved, in fact, that there seems no question that its use will become general. This time the improvement is by a person of the name of Maxim.

A new organ, to cost \$3,000, has been contracted for and will soon be placed in position in the Taylor St. Methodist Church, Portland. It is being manufactured in Oakland, Cal., by the same firm which made the mammoth organ in Kailash's Temple in San Francisco.

It is said that General Sherman will retire from the active list of the army this winter. His office will be vacated with his retirement, as was enacted by Congress, unless they choose to make it permanent. Lieutenant-General Sheridan will then be at the head of the army.

Page has started a movement for securing speedy action upon the bill offered by Goode, of Virginia, at the extra session, to restrict Chinese immigration, limiting the number of passengers to each vessel leaving China for the United States to fifteen. Page proposes to reduce the number to ten.

Dr. R. V. Pierce, Consulting Physician to the World's Dispensary and Invalids' Hotel, of Buffalo, N.Y., has resigned his seat in Congress that he may hereafter devote his whole time and attention to those applying to the World's Dispensary Medical Association for the treatment of Chronic Diseases.

Washington, Dec. 7th.—Senator Macdonald's bill for the taxation of legal tenders provides that any State or Territory may include in the valuation of personal property any legal tenders owned or held by any person or corporation in assessing taxes, and may tax them, but not at a greater rate of taxes than on gold and silver coin in the hands of individuals.

It is authoritatively stated that the new Chinese treaty will be sent to the Senate early in the session, so as to dispose of it as early as possible. California representatives, who have inquired diligently, say that it will, in a great measure, satisfy the coast, though not entirely. It is believed that no attempt will be made to pass a Chinese restrictive bill until after the treaty is disposed of.

LETTER FROM MARYLAND.

FOUR MEETING HOUSE, Baltimore Co., Md., Nov. 29, 1880. TO THE EDITOR OF THE TIMES:

Through the kindness of His Honor, Judge S. J. Day, we receive regularly the Times. Although it reaches us about ten days after date, the news is new to us, and is read with much interest.

We see by the marriage notices that a Judge of your Courts can perform the ceremony—a fact we did not know before. It is not lawful in this State. Winter has set in much earlier than usual. Ice was formed on the 21st, 22d and 23d insts. to the thickness of from three to five inches, according to locality, and the ice-men were busily engaged harvesting it.

Baltimore, the Monumental City, is to have another monument. The one proposed now is to be a memorial of the recent Sesqui-Centennial Exhibition. A large amount of money has already been subscribed.

Some enterprising merchants of Baltimore erected an obelisk of wood, covered with canvas, which was painted to represent the Egyptian Obelisk now standing in Central Park, New York. It was a "perfectly perfect" representation and was exhibited during the Sesqui.

A large number of canal boats have been frozen up (I believe that is the correct expression). They are laden with wheat, which has caused an advance in prices. It now brings from \$1.25 to \$1.30 per bushel. Yours truly, W. H. RIDDLE.

I. O. O. F.—The Sovereign Grand Lodge has passed the following laws: That any member of this order who has been a contributing member twenty-five years, upon change of residence, shall have the privilege of applying for membership in any Lodge at his new place of residence, without first applying for a withdrawal card from the Lodge in which he holds membership.

That upon election of such brother by the Lodge to which he shall apply for membership, said Lodge shall notify the Lodge of which he is a member of said election, when being from front charges and the payment of all dues and fees under proper application, he shall be entitled to a withdrawal card. Upon deposit of said card with the Lodge in which he has been elected, he shall be entitled to sign the Constitution and By-Laws and received in full membership from such time, upon the payment of the admission fees required by the By-Laws of said Lodge.

That an unmarried daughter of an Odd Fellow of the Irish Degree, who has attained the age of eighteen years, and whose parents are dead, may be admitted to membership in a Lodge of the Degree of Rebekah when proposed by the Noble Grand of the Lodge of which her father was a member at the time of his death, or by a member of a Lodge of the Degree of Rebekah, when furnished with a certificate from the Subordinate Lodge of which the father was a member, that he had attained the Scarlet Degree and was in good standing at the time of his death.

CIGARETTES.—The following from the San Francisco Daily Examiner is nothing but the truth, and yet we know that not a youth of the country will smoke a single cigarette less because of the tax. "For the benefit of whom cigarettes are dear, the way which many of them are prepared is submitted. The diligent Chinaman have divided the best of this city among themselves, and at early morning when the spittoon is cleared out the cigar stumps are carefully gathered by them, and sorted. A portion are placed in a tub of water, and in this tub the Chinaman stamps out the juice for the purpose of dyeing the papers of the chocolate-colored cigarette. The other portion is used for filling. Now boys, smoke your cigarette and be happy."

LAND FRAUDS IN OREGON.—The General Land Department sent a special agent—W. F. Prosser—to investigate the Willamette Valley and Cascade Mountains Military Wagon Road land grant, who reports that the road was not properly built, is without bridges and only adapted to the passage over of light wagons. The cost of constructing the road he places at \$5 per mile, for which the Government gave 400,000 acres of land. From this showing of the special agent, the surveyor and also the president of the company, who certified to the road, may possibly have placed themselves within the clutches of the law. The present owners of the road claim to be innocent purchasers.

CHEAT PRICES FOR WIVES.—It is reported to the Cayuga Chief, on what it considers trustworthy authority, that in the town of Congress, a few days ago, a man sold his wife to another; consideration \$5, and expense of drawing up the bill. The goods were delivered, and all parties concerned are said to be satisfied with the bargain. The transaction is only equalled by one of a similar character which occurred near Meriden about thirty years ago. In the latter case a man sold his wife for \$40. She lived with the purchaser four or five years afterward, when the original husband bought her back for a pair of boots.—Rochester Express.

CHANGES IN THE SENATE COMMITTEE.—By changes made in Senate committees Blair succeeds Ingalls on the Pension committee and Sherman on the Education committee. The Senate has decided to appoint select committees on Civil Service, Vost chairman; on Electoral Laws, Morgan chairman; on Epidemic Diseases, Harris chairman; Election Frauds, Wallace chairman; Nicaragua claims, Hampton chairman; Freedman's bank, Bruce chairman; on bill giving Cabinet seats in the House, Pendleton chairman; on library, Voorhees; on Negro exodus, Davis; Treasury investigation; Kirkwood, Chyenne Indians.
