IMPROVING STOCK.

Many farmers suppose that because they cannot buy a herd or a flock that therefore they must be content with growing scrub stock. On this subject the *Live Stock Journal* says it doesn't require a section of land, nor a big bank account, to make a beginning. You need not go to England, nor even to a sister State, to get the "blood" which is sure to "sell." Good, reliable breeders of Short-horns, Herefords, Holsteins, Jerseys, etc., are scattered all through the States, and will supply, at reasonable cost, a young male or a few cows, or whatever may be desired. A pure-blooded calf can be bought all the way from \$50 upwards, and bred to native cows will give half-blooded animals which, when grown, will sell readily at high figures, when the "scrubs" are not wanted at any price. If any farmer says he hasn't \$50 to spare, let him join his neighbor and own the animal in common. From this point of view the "cash-labor" plan disappears; for if necessary, a pool of \$5 each can be formed. In just that way the breeders of Madison, Clinton and other counties in Ohio, in early days, formed their associations for importing Short-horns from England, and the great results accomplished point the way for the common farmer.

A SWEEPING CHANGE.—A bill was introduced into the House of Representatives last Monday for Constitutional amendment, which provides that all Presidential, State or city elections shall be held on the first Monday of December; that the State Legislature shall divide the States into election precincts containing not over 500 electors. Each district shall have not less than one free public school, accessible to all children from five to twenty-one years old, without distinction on account of race or color; no State funds shall be appropriated for sectarian schools; no citizen born in the United States who has not attended public or other schools two years and is unable to read or write, shall vote. The failure of any State in these points shall be deemed a failure to maintain a republican form of government, and Congress may, by Act, exclude the Representatives of such State and the Electoral count of the same until the required legislation is enacted. Congress may enforce the amendment by legislation.

To PRESERVE HARNESS.—There is nothing lovelier in the way than a clean, bright looking set of harness; nor is there anything more quickly damaged by neglect. Harness should be washed and oiled frequently. To do this effectively the straps should be unbuckled and detached, and then washed with soft water and green soap, and hung by a slow fire or in the sun until nearly dry, then coated with a mixture of neatfoot oil and tallow, and allowed to remain in a warm room for several hours and when perfectly dry, rub thoroughly with a woolen rag. The rubbing is important, as it, in addition to removing the surplus oil and grease, tends to close the pores and give a finish to the leather. In hanging harness care should be taken to allow all the straps to hang well ventilated. All closets should be well ventilated, and when possible be well lighted. To clean plated mountings, use a chain with a little tripoli or ten stone; but they should be secured as little as possible.

THE MONEY DRIFT.—There is a good deal of uneasiness in the money centers of Europe on the drift of coin towards the United States. In the fourteen weeks prior to and up to the 5th instant, the Bank of England had lost \$8,312,285 of its gold, a decrease of 5.73 per cent. The Bank of France shows a reduction of \$42,365,740 specie. Its gold is diminished by \$39,495,104, a decrease of 25.79 per cent, and its silver by \$2,870,546, a decrease of only 1.14 per cent. The Imperial Bank of Germany notes a diminution of \$9,265,000, a decrease of 6.48 per cent, mainly in gold. The three institutions have lost \$58,943,595. This coin has mostly found its way towards this country. The specie in the Bank of England is substantially all gold. The specie in the Bank of France is composed of \$113,854,575 in gold coin and bullion and \$247,316,196 in five-franc pieces. Thus the bank holds only 31.52 per cent. of its specie in exportable money.

The question has very often been asked if the institution known as the Ancient Order of United Workmen is composed simply of laboring men. It is not; but is composed of men from every vocation in life. It is a general equal protection of every kind of honest labor, mental and physical. It has a fund from which is paid \$2,000 to the heirs or legatees of each member at the time of his death. It is a business institution, and its great benevolent arm is a continuous outstretched to aid the widow and orphan in the day of trouble. The A. O. U. W. conducts its business in secret because it is believed that that is the only way in which it could be done successfully and promptly. It is continually growing in strength, and it is a pity that it is not of the best institutions there is. —*Del Norte Record*.

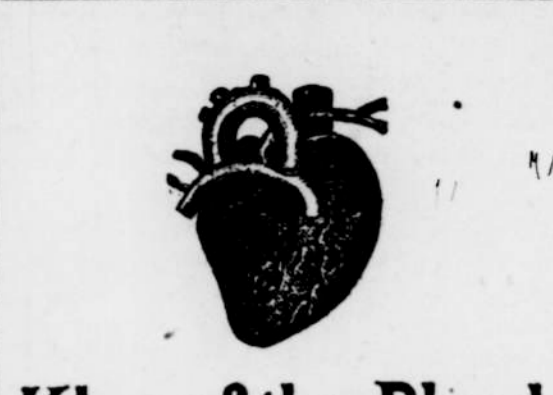

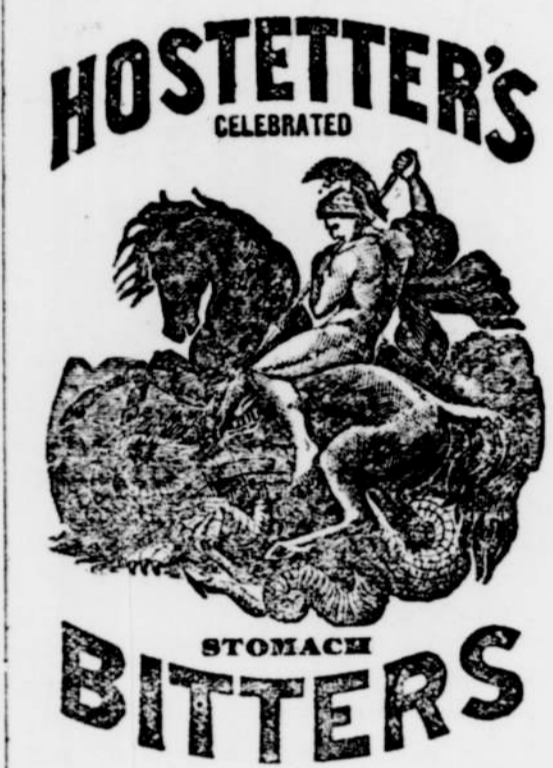
