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GENERAL NOTES AND NEWS.

Last year Oregon shipped to Great Britain wheat to the value of \$6,909,120.

It is reported at Washington that Garfield will continue Hayes policy of conciliation.

On all competing lines, the Western Union has reduced its rates 15 per cent.

The National Board of Trade adopted a resolution favoring Government management of the telegraph service by a two-thirds vote.

A joint resolution has been introduced in Congress to make the 12th of October—the date on which Columbus discovered America—a legal holiday.

The demand for vessels in the trade between America and Europe is greater than the supply, and 95 vessels, mostly steamers of the largest class, are building on the Clyde.

Congressman-elect George was a passenger last week on the out-going steamer. He will take his seat on the 4th of next March as Oregon's Representative in the House.

The expenditures of the Oregon State penitentiary for the quarter ending Nov. 29th had amounted to \$4,904. The earnings of convict labor during that period were \$1,424.

Although arrivals of European specie at New York for the past four months have been large, the total amount is less by several million dollars than was received during the same period last year.

A very loom in the mail of improvements in Jacksonville is noted. In respect to many points of advantage, (climate not the least), Jackson is the best county in Oregon.

The Secretary of the Interior on December 1st issued orders providing for an increase of Indian youth now educated at the Forest Grove, Oregon, industrial school and for forty or fifty additional at the Hampton, Va., school.

The latest negro exodus scheme is filling up New Mexico with freedmen from the South. Williams, the colored member of Ohio Legislature, is engineering it.

Nordenskiöld has ordered a vessel to be built at the mouth of the Lena, whence he will set out in 1885 on another voyage of discovery in the Arctic sea.

We give below the result of the Presidential election in the State of New York, taken from the official returns: Garfield, 555,544; Hancock, 534,511; Weaver, 12,372; Dow, 1,517.

The bill to restore General Fitz-John Porter to the Army has passed the Senate. It will be very sure to pass the House.

In Oregon the attention of fruit growers has been for the past few years directed toward prune culture. It has been found that this fruit yields greater profit for the outlay than any other.

The annual report of the commissioner of internal revenue gives the following figures as amounts of aggregate collections for the year in the districts named: California, Collector Higby's district, \$2,437,631; Collector Frost, \$345,984; Nevada district, \$60,465; Oregon, \$76,984; Washington Territory, \$27,081; Arizona, \$28,984; Colorado, \$168,259.

A New York dispatch of the 18th says: One hundred and eighty cases of scarlet fever and one hundred and sixty-six of diphtheria were reported last week. Up to noon today 179 cases of scarlet fever and 167 of diphtheria were reported.

The sale of J. M. Bacon, of Oregon City, was robbed of \$3,356 by burglars on the 21st inst., and there is no clue to the thieves.

IN THE HOUSE, ON Monday, Hon. W. H. Calkins, of Indiana, introduced the following resolution which was unanimously adopted: Resolved, That the sympathy of this House is hereby extended to the unhappy laboring class of Ireland in its effort to effect reform in the present oppressive tenant system prevailing in that country.

CALIFORNIA AND OREGON RAILROAD.

Congressman Berry has introduced a bill in Congress, to restore to the public domain, the land grant of the California and Oregon Railroad, in view of the failure to complete the road last July, and no effort being made to that end.

New York has received application for \$200,000,000 of the 3 per cent. proposed loan. It is reported at Washington that Garfield will continue Hayes policy of conciliation.

Washington Territory has a population of 74,753, and the population of Idaho is 32,611. It is announced that negotiations are nearly completed for the consolidation of the Union Pacific and Central Pacific railroads.

THE SUPREME COURT.—The new law relating to the holding of the Supreme Court does not go into effect until January 25th. A regular term of the Supreme Court will therefore begin on Monday, the 31st of January 1881, and continue probably until the cases docketed at that time are disposed of.
