TALL FRUITERS.—The report of the Commissioner of Agriculture, recently submitted to Congress, shows a very remarkable property in that Department. Almost without exception the agricultural production for 1880 is greater than for 1879. Following are some of the Commissioner's tall figures:
Products 1879—Breadstuffs, animals, animal matter, etc., \$1,919,954,307; 1880, \$2,000,000,000 (estimated); value of agricultural exports for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1879 and 1880. Animals and animal matter, 1879, \$146,641,233; 1880, \$166,400,428; breadstuffs, etc., 1879, \$210,391,066; 1880, \$228,050,201; cotton, etc., 1879, \$173,158,200; 1880, \$221,517,323; wool, etc., 1879, \$20,122,067; 1880, \$22,000,000; miscellaneous, 1879, \$53,843,026; 1880, \$49,000,000; total, 1879, \$604,156,422; 1880, \$746,067,933; total exports all kinds same years—1879, \$717,093,777; 1880, \$823,946,353. This exhibit, the Commissioner says, "shows ours is pre-eminently the agricultural country of the world."
DANGEROUS LIQUIDS.—Ammonia, especially the stronger kinds, is very dangerous, a few drops being enough to injure a person. When used for cleansing purposes it should be handled with great care, that the gas, which is given off freely in a warm room, be not breathed in large quantities and do injury to the delicate lining of the nose and mouth. Benzine is a liquid, in the handling of which much caution should be exercised. It is very volatile, and its vapor, as well as the liquid itself, is inflammable. When employed in removing grease or other stains from clothing, gloves, etc., it should never be used at night, nor any other time near a fire. Ether is another dangerous liquid, and in other than the physician's hands it had best not be employed in the household. Alcohol, when used, should be used with great care, especially at night.
