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TRANSPLANTING FRUIT TREES. ROCK POINT, March 1, 1882. TO THE EDITOR OF THE TIMES: As quite a number of citizens of Rogue river valley have requested information on transplanting fruit trees, by your permission I advance a few ideas through your valuable paper.

PREPARATION OF TREES. This is a very important operation, as portions of the roots are destroyed on being removed from the nursery.

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THE LENTEN SEASON. This season is universally observed by the members of the Episcopal and Catholic Churches, and the Catholic Archbishop at San Francisco, Jos. S. Alemany, has issued the following rules of observance for the Lenten season.

1. All the week days of Lent, from Ash Wednesday (February 22) till Easter Sunday are fast days of precept, on one meal, with the allowance of a moderate collation.

2. The precept of fasting implies also that of abstinence from the use of flesh meat. But, by dispensation from the respective pastors, which they are hereby authorized to grant in case of necessity.

3. The promiscuous use of fish and flesh at the same meal is forbidden in Lent, even on Sundays.

4. It should be carefully observed that, according to an answer of the Sacred Congregation of the Holy Office, to the Bishops of England in 1870, and to the Bishops of Ireland in 1877, the Holy See has never consented to have introduced the use of milk, butter, and still less, of cheese, at the evening collation on fast days.

5. The use of lard or other fat condiments is allowed in Lent and throughout the year, excepting Ash Wednesday, Ember-days throughout the year, the Eve of the Annunciation, the last four days of Holy Week, and the Eves of Pentecost, of the Assumption, of All Saints and of Christmas; and on Good Friday eggs and all lactiferous substances are forbidden throughout the day.

6. Some prayers, at option, are recommended during Lent, particularly on those days in which flesh meat is used.

7. Lent being a penitential time, the pastors are requested to lay before the faithful the importance of Christian modification, and also the rigorous obligation of complying with their duty, which may be fulfilled from the first Sunday of Lent; they will frequently and earnestly impress upon their respective flocks the necessity of attending, before all other things, to the salvation of their souls, and they will exhort them to the faithful discharge of their Christian duties, the only thing that can secure to us the everlasting happiness of heaven.

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MILLER'S CHINESE BILL. The following is the text of the bill to restrict Chinese immigration introduced by Senator Miller of California: Sec. 1. That the coming into, or residence in the United States of Chinese laborers, except as hereinafter provided, is hereby declared to be unlawful, and is suspended for the period of 25 years from and after the passage of this act.

Sec. 2. Chinese subjects, whether proceeding to the United States as teachers, students, merchants or from curiosity, together with their body and household servants and Chinese laborers, who were residing in the United States on the 17th day of November, 1880, and Chinese who have come into the United States between the 20th of November, 1880, and the passage of this act, shall upon being identified as hereinafter provided, be allowed to go and come of their own free will and accordingly shall be accorded all rights, privileges, immunities and exemptions which are accorded to citizens and subjects of the most favored nations.

Sec. 3. That the Chinese laborers described in the preceding section, who shall depart from the United States after the passage of this act, shall not be permitted to return and resume their residence, unless before their departure they shall have been duly registered at a custom house in the United States, and shall produce to the collector of the district in which they shall seek to re-enter the certificates of registration and consular certificates, as hereinafter provided; and such Chinese laborers, who have departed from the United States prior to the passage of this act, and any Chinese of the other permitted classes described in the second section of this act, shall as a condition of entry produce to the collector of the district in which they seek to enter the permission of the Chinese government and a consular certificate hereinafter provided.

Sec. 4. The secretary of the treasury is hereby invested with authority to carry into full effect the foregoing provisions; and for this purpose he shall forthwith cause to be prepared and kept at the custom houses of the United States proper books in such form as he shall prescribe for the registration of the Chinese who shall be entitled under the provisions of this act to the privilege of entering and residing in the United States. Such books shall contain the name of every Chinese registered and his proper signature; his place of birth, giving town or district; date of his place of residence before coming to the United States; place of residence in the United States; names and places of arrival in the United States; employment or business; height, weight and physical marks or peculiarities by which he may be identified. Every applicant for registration shall make oath to the facts stated in this registry, which oath shall be recorded in the book of registry; and in cases where the applicant claims the privilege of registration by reason of his having been in the United States on the 17th day of November, 1880, the fact of his residence therein shall be proved by the oath of two credible witnesses.

THE OREGON WAR CLAIMS IN CONGRESS.—C. M. Carter, formerly of Portland, writes in his paper, the National Reform, of Washington, D. C., a precedent for other similar claims. In the first allowance less than fifty per cent was paid. It is a shame the full amount was not allowed. Senators Grover and Slater and Representative George are working for their passage. The old Indian claims of one to twenty-five per cent standing, for services and supplies furnished in excess of appropriation, also spoliation claims amounting to millions. Bills have been introduced to pay them. We hope to have them paid by bill direct, or through the court of claims or through a commission to be created, or through a new tribunal proposed to be created to adjudicate such claims as do not go properly before a court of claims.

A WHOLE FOREST OF STROKE TREES.—From twenty to thirty miles from Denver, between Cherry creek and Running creek, the Denver and New Orleans Railroad force struck an unusual section, it being nothing less than a forest of trees. The trees are all petrified, gnarled, of many sizes and lie buried at various depths, from ten to twenty feet deep, which is as deep as any excavations were made by the workmen. They came upon these relics of a bygone age in at least half a dozen localities, and have not with not a little difficulty on their account. The trees are very perfect, and could be taken out nearly whole if suitable machinery was employed.
