

Eternal vigilance is the price of order in the school-room. The teacher must have an eye like a hawk to see what is going on, and a quick ear to detect noise. He should not be a spy. No nersons are more unfit to govern than they who show constant suspicion and distrust of their pupils. The spying teacher usually finds all the disorder, confusion and trickery that he is in search of, but in playing the spy he shows himself unworthy his office. The eacher can be watchful and alive to all

It is best to encourage and praise where it is possible to do so, and find fault and censure where the offense is of such a character as to interfere with the welfare of the school. The teacher who hapes to teach bis publis self-copiol must first be certain that he is after to control himself. Self-control gives the teacher that quiet dignity which is a necessity in order to secure and retain the espect of his pupils.

Many things will occur to ex and irritate him, and particularly is his true when his nerves are unstrung vill-health or over-work. But it is his uty to be patient even under these tryng cirenmstances. Children learn very lowly; they are forgetful, and they oughtlessly commit offenses against which they have been warned again and again. Through all these trials the teacher must be patient, and thus will win the respect and love of the most thoughtless and wayward. Cheerfulness. The teacher who can thwart mischief by turning the joke on he perpetrator rarely fails in dis-The cheerful teacher is a power in the school-room, and his influence is ten-
