The case of State versus Joe Wooley, indictment for murder in the first degree, in Harney county, was not even called. This is a peculiar and original way of disposing of such cases, but the truth is, the grand jury that indicted Wooley had no more authority for doing so than they had to hang him outright. Peter Thompson's case went the same way.






