

A. T. Stratton, secretary of the Y. M. A., brought into our office a Bible printed in London in 1610. This Bible was bought soon after it was published by John Stratton, and has been handed Dr. DAVID KENNEDY CORPORATION, Rondout, N. down from John to John till it came into the present owner's hands. A part of the family record remains, some entries being made in 1762. As this Bible appeared one year before the King James' version it is difficult to determine what translation it is, though it differs very little from the authorized version. The book is evidently in the original binding and is in a fair state of preservation. The page upon which the date is found needs protection or the most valuable part of the book will be lost. It is a rare relic and is highly prized by the owner .-
