THE GIST OF THE WEEK'S HAPPENINGS AS TOLD BY TELEGRAPH.

Interests News From Europe, Asia, Africa and North and South America.

Three masked men held up the store at Clay station, Cal. There were several men in the store at the time.

The Midwinter Fair will close on July 1. The last days of the exposition will be occupied by a horse show as a special feature.

G. W. Wilson, inventor of the Wilson sewing machine, died suddenly at San Jose of cancer. His home was in Chicago.

Andrew Jackson of Pine Bluff, Ark., was shot and instantly killed by his wife during a family quarrel.

James E. Malone of Wilson, appointed registrar of the land office at Perry, O. T., at the opening of the Cherokee strip, and who resigned in January, is on trial for bribery in office.

The inspection of the books of the missing treasurer of the Switchmen's Mutual Aid society, William A. Simarrat, has thus far failed to reveal any shortage.

A receiver has been appointed to wind up the affairs of the Hoffman House at New York.

One hundred police officers are escorting the health officials on their tour through the smallpox infected district in the southwestern portion of Chicago.

The Field Columbian museum, occupying the Art building at the World's Fair, has been dedicated. It is the largest museum in America.

In the Republican primaries to elect delegates to the state convention from San Francisco Kelley and Crimmins, the old houses, were completely knocked out by Dan Burns.

The California State Democratic convention will meet at San Francisco on Aug. 21.

Dakota Old Fellows are wrought up because the lodge at Fargo, N. D., has erected a \$14,000 building with money sent to Old Fellows who lost their homes by the big fire last year.

A party of excursionists near Tralee, Ireland, picked up an old shell and began rolling it along the ground. The shell exploded and killed three and wounded a dozen more.

The steamer Paris has arrived at New York from Southampton, having made the quickest passage on record over the southern course. She averaged 30.1 knots an hour.

Suit has been brought at San Francisco by the United States against the estate of the late Senator Stanford to recover \$15,000,000, the share of the Central Pacific debt.

A Cape Town dispatch says: Dispatches from Bulawayo say that the British troops, Daniels and Wilson, charged with appropriating \$1,000,000 which the late King Lobengula adopted, has been sentenced to fourteen years' imprisonment. The two men are held morally responsible for the massacre of the Wilson party.

The Viking ship, the celebrated reminder of the World's Fair festivities, has returned to Chicago after a six months' cruise on the Mississippi river and tributaries.

The Cheokes have concluded to treat with the Daves commission. New York police have captured a stranger. His name is Paul Jacopi. He strangled Minnie Wells on Memorial day.

At New York the sons of John Lane quarreled and fought at his bedside as he was dying over the disposition of the inheritance of about \$50,000.

The synod of the Reformed Presbytery at Philadelphia adopted resolutions against the admission of Utah on moral grounds.

C. H. J. Taylor, president of the Negro National Democratic league, has issued a call for a convention to be held in Indianapolis on Aug. 3.

Every mine in Central City, Colo., is flooded and there is not a vestige of a placer mine left in Clear creek. Between Central City and Forks creek there are 28 washes, averaging from 10 to 15 feet in width. Between Idaho Springs and Golden there are 28 washes. The mining men in Central City estimate the loss to the county at \$500,000.

The town of Winthrop, about 40 miles south of St. Joseph, Mo., on the Missouri river, has been almost washed into the river. The river is running where the main street was. Many neighboring farms are ruined.

At Colfax, Wash., Ed. Hill, under sentence for assault on Langford Summers, and George F. Parker, on trial for killing A. B. Cooper, were lynched from the veranda of the jail by a mob of 50 masked men. Hill killed Summers, who was an old man, two years ago and escaped from jail. He was arrested a short time ago and was tried and convicted of assault. The jury before whom Parker was being tried witnessed the lynching. They slept in the jail and were awakened by noise. None of the lynching party are known.

The gold coinage executed at the Philadelphia mint during the present fiscal year was the largest in the history of the mint. The total was about \$90,000,000 against \$1,840,302 for the calendar year 1893, and \$1,282,185 for 1892. The largest previous record was in 1861, when the gold coinage was \$67,583,150 and in 1881, when the amount was \$77,332,810. The large coinage of the present year has been due principally to the demands for gold from the treasury. The export demand now has to be met with coin, for the act of 1890 authorizes the secretary of the treasury to impose a charge for gold bars.
