Will McClure, appointed by Representative Hermann to the West Point Academy, failed to pass the examination in mathematics, and has returned to Eugene. Receiver Clark of the Oregon Pacific R. R. last week paid out \$840 for wages to employees of the road during the month, and had something left to use for repairing.

Holiday goods are being slaughtered at the S. F. Variety Store in Jacksonville, being sold at actual cost. Samuel G. Brown, who murdered young Kiebold at Oakland, Douglas county, last August, was sentenced last week by Judge Fullerton to be hanged on February 19th next.

According to the assessment rolls from each county, the property of the whole state is assessed at \$135,830,045, against \$179,587,770 for 1893, a decrease of 12 per cent. The new light at the mouth of the Umpqua river will be in operation about January 1st, and will cost \$50,000. It is of the first order and an important aid to navigation.

The census returns just published show a total Japanese population of 41,386,265, the males exceeding the females by about 400,000. The increase over the last recorded year was 296,325. The house appropriations committee has passed the fortification bill for the next fiscal year. It carries an appropriation of \$1,879,067, but the \$3,479,646 below the estimates on which it is based.

On Saturday, convicted of robbing the Pacific Express Company at The Dalles, was sentenced to four years in the penitentiary. Frank Klein, who turned state's evidence, was given 18 months. The Oregon Pacific railroad was sold at sheriff's sale Saturday afternoon to Bonner & Hammond of Missoula, Mont., for \$100,000. About \$11,000,000 has been spent in the construction of the road. The wool receipts at the Pendleton scouring mill for 1894 were 3,623,818 pounds; amount secured, 2,162,777 pounds. The total receipts made about 128 carloads, and the saving to growers was \$28,196.08.

Li Hung Chang is worth \$500,000,000, and he got most of it by "sawing" Chinese officers under his command, says Donald Fraser, president of a national bank located at Hong Kong, who has arrived at Tacoma.
