A traveling painter, named Reynolds, was drowned in the Klamath river at Klamathon, Wednesday, Feb. 6th. He was crossing the river on the railroad bridge, and fell off into the stream. He was drowned before parties, who had seen him fall, could rescue him. The body was recovered and an inquest held Friday. The unfortunate man, who according to reports, was in an intoxicated condition at the time the accident befell him, had painted brushes, a banjo and a guitar in his possession. Reynolds was in Jacksonville a few days before the accident occurred, offering to paint or pick the banjo and sing for a nickel or two.

Hon. E. D. Briggs has, by request, introduced a bill establishing a new board of horticulture, which is to consist of eight members to be appointed by a commission, consisting of the governor, secretary of state and state treasurer. One of these members is to represent the state at large, and is to be chairman of the board. The other members are to represent the following seven districts: First, Clatsop, Columbia, Tillamook, Washington, Multnomah and Yamhill counties; second, Marion, Polk, Lincoln, Benton and Clackamas; third, Lane, Douglas, Coos and Linn; fourth, Curry, Josephine, Jackson, Klamath and Lake; fifth, Wasco, Cook, Sherman and Wheeler; sixth, Gilliam, Morrow, Umatilla, Grant and Harney; seventh, Wallowa, Union, Baker and Malheur.
