Skobeleff Refore Constantinople. Now Will You Smile!-An Army In Danger.

Frederic Villiers, the famous war artist, in an autobiographical sketch contributed to a London periodical, gives this picturesque description of his last meeting with General Skobeleff:

"He was far and away the most brilliant soldier I ever met; a man with mad ideas and sane execution. The last time I saw him was when the Russian army faced Constantinopie, a splendid instance of the survival of the fittest, 30,000 grim warriors who had come through the terrible Russo-Turkish campaign under Skobeleff, ready at a moment's notice to occupy the city of sultans. It was a gray afternoon. The great general stood outside his tent, bareheaded, scalp shaven like a Mussuiman, flowing yellow beard blown about by the wind. I had arrived from Constantinople to bid farewell to him, as I had been ordered to Malta to meet the Indian contingent. Skobe-

leff said to me: "Not goodby, Villiers, but an revolr. We shall meet again, but how? Will it be when the Russians face the British?" for Skobeleff fully believed, as did most people in 1878, that there would be a campaign between England and Russia, or will you throw in your fortunes with us and come with me? It would be a new experience

for you." "But," I said, "general, how would it be if you were beaten, for you know we English are never defeated?"

He laughed and said: "Well, anyhow, I shall be well looked after. No harm shall come to you in your case.' I never saw him again.
