Fire followed the mine explosion and they were caught in a fiery furnace, making all human efforts impossible to save any of them, a wall of fire holding the rescuers back. The scenes at the mouth of the mine were heartrending. Many of the entombed miners are married men and have families. They were all gathered at the mine shortly after the first explosion.

Further acquaintance with the young man dissatisfied her and she broke the engagement. Burton sought another interview to talk over their troubles. Under the threat to kill her and himself on the spot she yielded to go to his room to do their talking. Here she refused to have anything further to do with him. He then shot at her twice, the first bullet just grazed her head and the second struck her in the left cheek, passed through the bones of her face, lodged directly opposite the point of entry under the skin of the right cheek. Screaming, she fell to the floor. Thinking he had killed her, Henderson turned the 44 pistol on himself with fatal results, the bullet entering the temple and lodging in the brain. Miss O'Neill was taken to the hospital, and will survive her wounds.
