New Road Laws.

The late legislature passed the following laws, relating to roads, which are of considerable importance:

H. B. 108, to provide for the collection mills on the dollar, based on the previous year's assessment. The fund thus created is to be expended under the direction of a county road. who has supervision of the road super-visors. Upon the petition of 12 free-holders of any road district, approved by the roadmaster, for the improvecourt is also authorized to purchase The tax provided for in this act is in lieu of taxes heretofore made collectble under other acts.

House bill 205, which is also a law aiready, requires the collection of a road poil tax of \$3 from every male inhabitant over 21 and under 56 years quire that it be paid in cash. If any person refuses to pay the tax a suit may be brought in a justice's court to collect the same, and the wages of the delinquent may be levied upon to collect any judgment recovered. The tax must be expended upon the roads of the district is which collected. The tax becomes due on March 1st, and may be collected between March 1st

The New Bicycle Law.

The new bicycle path law, which went into effect Feb. 26th, authorize; county courts to construct bicycle paths, and to levy a license tax of \$1 upon each person riding a bicycle in the county. The act provides for the the county. The act provides for the issuance of a tag similar to that issued under the old law. It is made unlawful for any person to ride a bicycle upon a bicycle path without having paid the license tax. The sheriff is authorized to seize a bicycle and sell mills at Klamathon, to which point the same as upon execution, in order to realize the amount of the tax. The law also provides that every bicycle shall be provided with a bell and at night with a good light. Bicycle paths constructed under the old law are declared to be bicycle paths under the provisions of this act. It is ex-pected that this act will be legal, in that it provides a license for riding and not a tax upon the bicycle.
