The new Salem postoffice building will soon be a fact. The appropriation for it has been made—\$110,000.

Senator Wm. P. Frye of Maine has been re-elected unanimously president pro tem of the U. S. Senate. This is the second time he has been honored by his colleagues.

The treasury department has issued a warrant in favor of Admiral Dewey for \$9570, on account of prize money for the destruction of the Spanish fleet in Manila harbor.

The new law relating to the publication of supreme court reports provides that not to exceed 600 volumes shall be printed; that each volume shall contain not less than 700 pages, and that the reports hereafter printed shall be sold at \$3.50 per volume. The reports heretofore printed have contained only 600 pages, and have been sold at \$5 per volume.

It is said that the rush to Nome will be as great this spring as it was last. The basis for such a rush is not clear. Certainly it cannot be in the prospect of destitute hundreds who were brought back by the government, or to that of discouraged thousands who counted themselves fortunate in having made money enough during the summer to pay their way home. A totally different class of people will go to Nome this year, it is said; and this offers the only possible explanation of the statement that the exodus thither will be large.

The present pension laws require an annual expenditure of \$145,245,230. The National Homes for Disabled Volunteer Soldiers require this year an appropriation of more than \$3,000,000, and the State Homes for Disabled Volunteer Soldiers will receive \$950,000. The last session of Congress appropriated \$325,000 for back pay and bounty to soldiers of the civil war; \$200,000 for arrears in pay in the Spanish war, and \$27,000 for artificial limbs and appliances. This does not take into account the \$4,000,000 for annual salaries and expenses in operation of the pension bureau and the record and pension office.
