THE PRESIDENTIAL TRAIN.

The special train upon which the President and his party are making the ten thousand-mile trip to the Pacific coast and return consists of an engine and seven cars—the combination baggage and smoking car Atlantic, the dining car St. James, two staterooms and two drawing rooms, the Omaha and the Diana, two twelve-section drawing-room sleepers, the Pelion and the Charmion, the private car Olympia, which will be occupied by President and Mrs. McKinley.

The greatest of precautions will be taken to prevent any accident from occurring to the "President's Special," which will pass through Ashland Tuesday, May 21st. The train will be preceded 15 minutes by a pilot engine, to which there will probably be attached one or more cars.

He won five of the six events in which he contested, and tied for second place in the sixth, the high jump. The report issued by the British war office, covering the British casualties in the South African field force from the beginning of the war to April 1, 1901, shows that there have been a total of 14,424 deaths in battle; 775 missing and prisoners; invalids sent home who have left the service as unfit 2189; making a ghastly total of 17,692 men lost to the nation. The misery of war cannot be told in figures; imagination, indeed, is unable to estimate or the ordinary human mind to comprehend it. The difficulty of forecasting the cost or duration of war, illustrated so forcibly in the call of Lincoln for troops to put down the rebellion in the South, has again been notably presented by Great Britain's experience in the present war in South Africa. Its cost was fixed by Mr. Chamberlain at from \$10,000,000 to \$20,000,000. As announced by the chancellor of the exchequer in the Commons recently, the cost from simply a monetary point of view, of this war up to the present time has been \$151,500,000—double the cost of the Crimean war.

It was ordered that warrants for \$300, \$152 and \$150, amounts appropriated for improvement of Big Sticky lane, road from Central Point to Esch Point and Bybee's bridge, and road from Jacksonville to Medford, to be drawn in favor of Wm. S. Crowell, the money to be disbursed by him by check.
