The usual summer force of forest rangers, to protect the forest reserves of Oregon and Washington, will be put on the payroll about June 1, as in seasons past, and will be retained through the summer months. The force this year will be about the same size as that which was employed last summer, and in making the appointments due preference will be given to those who were employed as rangers in past seasons, provided their service were satisfactory. There will be from forty-five to fifty rangers in both Oregon and Washington.
