The Northwest Fruitgrowers' Association, which held a session at Portland recently, adopted the following standard size for apple boxes: namely, inside measurement, 18 inches in length, 11 inches width, 10 1/2 inches deep, containing 2173 cubic inches and to be known as "standard." The committee recommended the following size to be known as "special": Length 20 inches, width 11 inches, depth 10 inches and that ends of box be seven-eighths of an inch thick.

At San Francisco, May 18th, Miss Barber pressed the button, Miss Desher smashed a bottle of California champagne, and the big battleship Ohio took her first dip into the sea. The N. Y. Journal of Commerce says: It seems to be generally acknowledged that the truce between the Morgan and Kuhn, Loeb & Co. interests in their contest for the control of the Northern Pacific has assumed the dignity of a definite settlement of future policy, and that attempts will be made to reconstruct, so far as is necessary, the "community of interests" plan of railroad management on a new basis. This means that the Northwestern roads are to be brought more thoroughly and directly into the fold than has heretofore been contemplated. Kuhn-Loeb interests are already heavy holders in the Great Northern, and their recent purchases of Northern Pacific make that road distinctly a Harriman road, notwithstanding that the nominal control shall still remain with J. P. Morgan & Co.

THE TRANSVAAL WAR.

The Pretoria correspondent of the London Times, in a letter dated April 18th, says: "In another fortnight the South African winter will have arrived, and unless the Boers are prevented from moving north to the bushveldt and hostilities are somewhat ended, there will be a series of fights and campaigning in an unsatisfactory country together with five months of peace in the two colonies to be broken by a recrudescence of guerrilla operations all over the country when the spring rains enable the enemy to operate on the high veldt. But this will mean no respite to the troops, no moving into winter quarters; but only a continuance of the most demoralizing warfare that can be undertaken."

The correspondent then describes a "strenuous scheme which is on foot to prevent the enemy retiring north into winter quarters;" but he does not appear to be very sanguine of its success. The figures of the intelligence bureau, he says, "show that there are still between 18,000 and 19,000 burghers available for service, although no commando is known to exist larger than 800 men."
