The receiver of the Gilbert Bros. bank at Salem reports assets of a face value of \$164,140, with liabilities aggregating \$191,853. There will be a considerable shrinkage of assets on account of worthless securities held by the bank.

The 29th annual reunion of the Oregon Pioneer Association will be held at Portland, Friday, June 14. It will be a first-class one. All persons coming to or born in the original territory of Oregon prior to February 14, 1859, without regard to where they now reside, are eligible to membership.

G. H. Daniels, general passenger agent of the New York Central lines, has made Oregon apples a standard article in the dining cars of the system. Hereafter they will figure daily on the bill of fare of every train, where they are to be listed as Oregon apples. Our apples have deservedly gained a wide reputation.

An official statement received at Dawson from Ottawa shows that up to the first of this year the total royalty collected from the Klondike placer mines by the Canadian government amounts to \$2,049,192.51. The statement also contains the information that the total revenues received by the Canadian government from Yukon territory since 1896 amounts to \$4,376,673.16. This includes receipts from royalties, customs, public works, fisheries, fees in various departments, land sales, rentals, timber dues, placer grants, sales of miners' certificates and the like.

The grand encampment of Odd Fellows and the grand convention of Rebekahs, the ladies' branch of Odd Fellowship of Oregon, convened at Baker city on the 21st. There was a large attendance. The officers elected for the encampment for the ensuing year are: Thos. F. Ryan, Oregon city, grand patriarch; P. W. Stewart, Portland, high priest; T. F. Howard, Pendleton, warden; E. E. Sharon, Portland, scribe; Byron E. Miller, Portland, treasurer; William Green, Eugene, junior warden; A. W. Bowser, Albany, representative; Claud Gatch, Salem, marshal; M. S. Kalfe, Salem, sentinel; W. R. Cunningham, Canyon city, outside sentinel.

The United States circuit court of appeals at San Francisco has affirmed the judgment given in Portland by Judge Bellingier, in the cases of settlers on indemnity lands in the Roseburg land district against the U. & C. R. R. About 300,000 acres are involved in the litigation. The company set up that not only its grant of 20 miles on each side of the U. & C. R. R. line were reserved to it, but that the indemnity lands were also reserved to it from which to complete its selections, and that none had a right to locate on such lands until it had completed its selections. The settlers interested in these cases located on the indemnity lands before they were set apart as such, and were waiting for the lands to be surveyed in order to file on them. Judge Bellingier decided that the settlers on these lands had a prior right to their claims, and ordered the filings of the railroad company to be canceled.

MINING NEWS.

Gold mining in Australia has produced \$2,170,000,000 in 50 years.

The American Mining Code, standard authority on all subjects pertaining to mining, water-rights, etc., is kept on hand at THE TIMES office.

Thos. F. Bourke, who last year invested in some placer mines in Democrat gulch district, is operating them with considerable success. He has a first-class property.

Fred. Bolt of Gold Hill has become interested with Geo. Hoffman in a quartz ledge in Tallow Box mountain district, having purchased John Pool's interest. It promises to be a good one.

The pay chute in the noted Jillson mine, which is situated near Hornbrook, Calif., has been lost, after producing a million dollars. About 50 men have been discharged, about ten being retained to do the development work.

The Town Talk says that Allen Davis, Yeo & Co., E. A. Carter, S. O. Furrey, G. W. Trefren, S. R. Reeves, M. A. Carter and Sid Carter of Ashland have located the big ledge on Yellow Butte, the width of which is 25 feet. They will commence development work at once.

Meredith & Wilson, who are operating extensively in the placers of Illinois river district, have completed this season's work, assisted by the pressure furnished by their suspension pipe bridge they stripped much more ground than they did last year. It is estimated that their cleanup amounted to \$10,000.

W. K. Rodgers & Co., who have a force of men employed in developing the Oregon Bonanza mine, situated in Williams creek district, are taking out a considerable quantity of good ore, some of which is estimated to yield \$50 a ton. The ledge is about twenty inches wide, and a depth of 300 feet has been attained. Steam hoisting machinery has been ordered for the mine.

Decoration Day Programme.
On Sunday, May 26, 1901, the G. A. R. Post and W. R. C. of Medford will assemble at Post hall at 10:15 A. M. and proceed to the opera house where, at 11 o'clock, services will be held. Rev. and Comrade L. C. Corwin will deliver the address. Music by Prof. N. L. Narracon and the High School Glee Club. On Thursday, May 30th, Decoration day will be observed in Medford by the G. A. R. and W. R. C. in the following manner: Post and Corps and little girls representing the states will assemble at Post hall at 9:45 A. M., where they will form parade and proceed to the opera house, preceded by the High School band. On arriving at the opera house the following programme will be carried out: Call to order, Post Commander F. Kassbauer; music, dirge, High School Band; reading of orders, Post Adjutant D. R. Andrus, prayer, Rev. W. B. Moore; address of welcome, Post Commander; Pleyel's hymn, High School orchestra; service by post officers; Hall, Home of Liberty, High School chorus; oration, J. L. Hammersly of Gold Hill; The Vacant Chair, boy's chorus; announcements; Glory, Glory Hallelujah, chorus and audience; benediction; adjournment for dinner. At 2 o'clock P. M. we will assemble in front of the opera house, form in line and proceed to the I. O. O. F. cemetery, and at 3 o'clock the regular Decoration day services will be carried out, and the graves of comrades decorated with flags and flowers. All old soldiers are earnestly requested to meet and participate with us. The public schools and all benevolent societies and all citizens of Medford and vicinity are cordially invited to take part in these exercises and observe the national day as a day of remembrance to the nation's departed defenders, as well as to all departed friends, and strew their graves with beautiful flowers.
