THE Boer war is once more about to end. It has closed very much in the same way many times within the past year or two. Whenever you find the British papers boastfully telling the world that the war is about at an end, then look out; something is going to happen. This time just as the war is rapidly winding to a close, that incorrigible rebel, Delarey, makes a descent upon Gen. Dixon's camp, and after a day's severe fighting, closes the battle with six hundred British prisoners and six cannon in his possession, and has succeeded in killing forty-six British soldiers and officers, and wounding eighty more. We are not posted as to just how soon the war will close again; but we may rest assured that every time it does close the British are sure to get licked.

THE people of Oregon are asking, or if they are not they ought to be, what is to be done in the case of the wholesale robbery of the state school land funds by Geo. W. Davis, a former clerk of the State Board. Several months have elapsed since the discovery was made that Davis was defaulter in the sum of \$31,000 and the state school fund was short to that amount, and yet it appears that up to date little or nothing has been done to reimburse the said fund or punish the public thief. It is certainly high time that public conscience should be sufficiently aroused to demand that an official thief be as vigorously prosecuted as the thief who steals a side of bacon to feed his starving family, if not more so. The good people of this state should raise such a din about the ears of the state officials as will make it necessary for them to go to the bottom of this public disgrace, and make official stealing as heinous a crime as any other.

THE lynching "bee," which was enacted at Lookout, in Modoc county, Calif., a short time since, at which five men were taken from the custody of officers and hanged to a bridge by a company of forty or fifty outraged citizens of the county, is only another proof of the slackness of the courts in the prosecution of criminals. The people at large have come to understand that through the ignorance or prejudice of juries, the dereliction of courts or the machinations of unscrupulous lawyers, who by hook or crook, are determined to win their case regardless of the public welfare, that about nine out of ten of the criminals are set at liberty to continue to ply their nefarious occupations among the people. There is little doubt that these five men were a pack of thieves who had been preying upon the honest public for years, but with all the technicalities of modern courts, and the inexplicable labyrinth of modern laws there is little chance to convict the worst criminals. The people of Modoc county knew this and so took the execution of justice into their own hands and did it with a vengeance. The way to stop lynching is to enforce the law against crime.

THE voters of Oregon will be called upon to cast their ballots at the next regular state election for or against an amendment to the constitution providing for legislation by the system known as the "Initiative and Referendum." The constitution of Oregon provides that all amendments must pass the legislature at two successive sessions, and then be ratified by a majority vote of the legal voters of the state. The amendment providing for the initiative and referendum has twice passed the legislature, and now goes to the people for their ratification. This is a very important measure and should not be overlooked or lightly esteemed by the people of Oregon. If adopted it will effectually shut off legislative graft, as all important laws will be voted upon by the voters before they can go into effect. Of course if any measure detrimental to the interests of the people should be enacted by the legislature it will be ventilated before the next election, and will be voted down. Then again, it will prevent the enacting of so many frivolous laws in the state, as ambitious legislators will not care to have their trivial measures run the gauntlet of an election by the people. Then again, it would result in the laws being expressed in plainer and clearer terms, so as to be understood by everybody, and would also make it necessary for the legal voters to acquaint themselves with the statute laws of the state. So it is high time for the people to be studying up this measure so as to be prepared to vote on it intelligently.
