Running the gantlet as a military punishment was, it is said, originated by Gustavus Adolphus to punish thieves in his army. It was borrowed by the English from the Germans, who copied it from Gustavus, and, being employed in the British regiments in America, was readily taken up by the Indians of this country.

A Splendid Opportunity for Miners and Prospectors.

The following specifications for free concentration tests at the mining exhibit at the Portland carnival have been made:

All parties having base concentrating ore can have practical working tests made on from 1000 to 1500 pounds of ore on the following terms and conditions. Said tests will be made on the New Standard Concentrator, a strictly up-to-date machine.

1. 1000 or 1500 pounds of ore to be shipped to Portland, all freight charges to be prepaid consigned to the undersigned.

2. Ore is to be sacked in regular sacks before shipment. Parties having crushing machinery, or who can have the ore crushed before shipment, are requested to have it crushed to 20 or 30 mesh, according to the character of the ore. If crushing cannot be done before shipment, it should be broken by hand so that largest pieces are not greater than egg size.

3. Parties contemplating shipping ore for tests should advise the undersigned in advance, so that the date of tests, etc., can be arranged for. As the number of tests is limited and several applications have already been received, only one that is arranged for in advance can be worked.

4. Parties interested are invited to be present when tests are made.

5. No charge will be made for tests after ore reaches Portland, provided above instructions are followed, and full reports will be made to shippers of ore, showing value of ore, concentrates, etc.

6. Samples of ore, concentrates, tailings and slimes will be furnished shippers of ore after tests have been made; but the balance of the concentrates will belong to the committee, and will be sold to pay the costs of tests, and can be purchased by the owners of the property making shipments, at market value, if desired. If parties wish to purchase concentrates they should state that fact when ore is shipped.

7. Applications for concentrating tests will be acted on in the order in which they are received.

8. Shipments should show name of shippers for identification.
