

The testimony of the prosecution in the Naval Court of Inquiry is proving much more favorable to Schley than expected. The Admiral will certainly be vindicated.

HOMER DAVENPORT, the noted cartoonist, has arrived at Silverton, Marion county, from New York, in response to a telegram informing him of the serious accident which befell his father, T. W. Davenport. The latter is recovering.

UNKNOWN MEN attacked the guards at ex-President McKinley's tomb Sunday night; but were driven away. It is the belief that their intention was to blow up the tomb. There were five or six of the attacking party, and they were armed.

The first race between Sir Thomas Lipton's Shamrock II and the New York Yacht Club's Columbia, (the victor of the contest two years ago) which took place last Saturday, was won by the latter by a very narrow margin—considerably less than a minute some newspapers report. The English yacht is much faster and manned better than any that has ever crossed the Atlantic.

SETH LOW, having been nominated by the anti-Tammany forces for mayor of Greater New York, the Republicans, who have no chance of electing anybody in that city, endorsed his candidacy. The Independent Democrats say that faith has been broken with them, and will put up another ticket or support Bird Coler, if he is nominated by Tammany. A very interesting contest is promised.

A DASTROUS FIGHT between United States troops and insurgents occurred in the Island of Samar, near Balangiga, Sept. 28th. A large body of insurgents attacked Company C, Ninth Infantry, only 24 members of which escaped. All the others are reported to have been killed. The company was at breakfast when attacked, and made a determined resistance; but the overwhelming number of the insurgents compelled them to retreat. Of the survivors who have arrived at Basey 11 are wounded. According to the latest returns the strength of the company was 73.

At the Pan-American Exposition grounds, Sept. 25th, the Temple of Music was crowded for the special Oregon exercises. Commissioner Dosch presided. The Rev. Charles Edward Locke delivered the invocation, in which he referred appreciatively to the Oregon pioneers and their great work. Webber's military band played "Oregon Volunteers." The address of welcome was delivered by Director-General Buchanan, and E. L. Smith of Hood river responded on behalf of the Governor in a pleasing address on the development of Oregon. H. W. Scott spoke of his state in a way that brought general applause. Mrs. E. T. Weathered set forth the project for the Lewis and Clark Centennial Exposition in Portland.

THE census report lately received shows the death rate in Oregon to be a little less than ten per cent, about the lowest of any state in the United States. The average for the whole country is approximately 15 per cent. Portland is about the average of the state and probably of the other cities in the state, 9.5 per cent. Both San Francisco and Los Angeles are 20 per cent. San Jose is 24 per cent. San Diego 22 per cent. The highest is Savannah, Ga., 34 per cent. In Oregon in 1900 there died 372 under 1 year, 100 at 1, 73 at 2, 40 at 3, 38 at 4, 137 between 5 and 9, 119 between 10 and 14, 161 between 15 and 19, 180 between 20 and 24, 150 to 170 each four years up to 60, 60 to 64 there were 191, 65 to 69, 223, 70 to 74, 227, 75 to 79, 173, 80 to 84, 90, 85 to 89, 64, 90 to 94, 20, and over 95, 8, indicating a long-lived condition of affairs here.

The Klondike has been connected by telegraph with the outside world, the first message being sent by Gov. Ross last week from Vancouver, B. C. to Dawson. The line touches at Atlin, White Horse and Fort Simpson, and is 2200 miles long.

Czolgosz, the cowardly assassin of Mr. McKinley, was taken to the Auburn prison Sept. 27th, after sentence of death had been passed, by the sheriff of Erie county and 20 deputies. He collapsed entirely and was carried into prison, terror-stricken. Oct. 25th he will be electrocuted.

"The fact that Oregon has been awarded the 'Wilderness medal,' the highest award obtainable in America, has been heralded throughout the East," writes Commissioner Dosch, from Buffalo, "and visitors at the exposition are anxious to see the fruit that won this much-coveted prize."

Baron von Lynden, minister of foreign affairs of Holland, has forwarded to the Legations and members of the council of the court of arbitration a copy of the Boer appeal for arbitration, with a notification that he intended to bring up the appeal for consideration at the first meeting of the council. The date of the meeting is not fixed.
