ELECTROCUTION OF THE ASSASSIN OF THE LATE PRESIDENT MCKINLEY TOOK PLACE WITHOUT ANY

At Auburn prison, N. Y., Oct. 29th, Leon Czolgosz, the assassin of Presi-dent McKinley, was electrocuted at 7:12 o'clock A. M.
