

### An Important Concession.

The extension of the special settlers' rates recently announced, to every point on the lines of the Southern Pacific in Oregon, will prove more of a boon to the Willamette, Umpqua and Rogue river valleys than may be supposed. This is the first time that rates of any kind from Chicago, St. Paul and Missouri river points have been extended further than Portland and settlers who desired to locate in Western and Southern Oregon were compelled to pay the local rate, which for distant points nearly equalled the special rates made from St. Paul to Portland. When the recent rates were announced and he saw that Western Oregon was left out, General Passenger Agent Miller of the Southern Pacific did not propose to be this part of the state with a fertile farm to get the worst of it if he could help it. That his efforts are highly successful is evidenced by the fact that the Union Pacific and R. & N. companies have already agreed to the arrangement, whereby points on the Southern Pacific in Oregon will get exactly the same rates as Portland and Puget Sound. This means that homeseekers can travel nearly 350 miles farther after reaching Portland, in the event that they desire to locate in Southern Oregon. The fare from Chicago is \$33; from St. Louis, \$30; from Sioux city, \$30; and from St. Paul and Minneapolis, \$25. Were the local fares extended settlers going as far south as Oakland, for instance, would be obliged to pay about \$14 more. Now a fare takes them to their destination. This is but another evidence of the liberal industrial policy pursued by the S. P. Co. in the interest of the territory contiguous to its lines, since Mr. Miller became connected with it. It means that the Willamette, Umpqua and Rogue river valleys hereafter are to participate in all the benefits afforded by other sections of the northwest. That it will be productive of such good there can be no question. The special settlers' rates will become effective March 1st and continue for two months.

### Greenland Dogs.

The Greenland dogs are harnessed four to ten to a sledge and laden with four or five heavy seals. They sometimes cover sixty English miles in a day. A courier once performed a journey of 270 miles in four days. When the dogs are used, two and two are driven abreast, with the leader in front. They are tractable unless the whip is too freely used, when they will fall to worrying each other. The dogs are trained to hunt seals and the bear, and they fight to the death even among themselves. They swim well too. When they sleep, they make a bed for themselves by excavating the snow with their paws and nose, after which they bury themselves in the hole, leaving nothing but the nose exposed.

### SUCCESSFUL HORTICULTURE.

#### OREGON GROWERS RECEIVED \$2.25 PER BOX NET.

Two dollars and a quarter net per box is the price of the Oregon apples of Central Point, Jackson county, received for a carload of Oregon Newtons sold in the London market a day or two before Christmas. Another car, sold a few days later, when the market was a little off, brought \$1.75 net. More of the same apples are now in London, and returns are expected at any time.

J. D. Olwell was in Corvallis last week to attend the meeting of the board of regents of the Agricultural College. The Olwell Bros. have an orchard at Central Point of 100 acres. They had \$12,000 worth of apples aboard the cars and on the way to market at one time last fall. The orchard is 13 years old, and the late crop is the fourth. Its aggregate this season was 35 cars, against 55 cars last year; but the better prices of this year made the output about as profitable as formerly.

The Olwell Spitzbergs brought \$1.50 net. They were mostly marketed in New York and Chicago. The buyer came to the orchard in August, and contracted for all the Spitzbergs before the apples had matured. He remained there and paid spot cash for each car as it was shipped. The former price realized for Spitzbergs was about \$1 per box. The former price of the Newtons, now selling in London at prices that net \$2.25 and \$1.75, was \$1.05 to \$1.10 per box. The Ben Davis variety in the Olwell orchard brought at the orchard this year \$1.10 to \$1.20 per box. They were mostly sold in New Orleans, which is not particularly about the grade of apples it consumes. Last year the Olwell Ben Davis apples went at 65 cents per box.

At the Olwell orchard at picking time 70 men were employed. At packing time, which began after the picking and extended nearly to the holidays, 30 men and 16 girls were kept at work.

The codlin moth has practically been run out of the Central Point district by the spray pump. Formerly 50 per cent. or more of the crop was destroyed by the worms; but by diligent spraying the per cent. of loss on this account is reduced to less than 5. In the Olwell orchard the spray pumps are operated by gasoline engines.

Mr. Olwell believes that much of the same success in growing apples in the Central Point district can be attained in the Willamette valley. All that is necessary, he thinks, in order to make large orchards successful in the Willamette valley is to be careful in the selection of soil and location, and then take good care of the orchard.

### ABOUT GAME BIRDS.

Game and Forestry Warden Quimby has just transmitted to the government his annual report. According to it Oregon's game birds are more than holding their own. While many have been killed out of season, the protection given them by law is serving a good purpose. Among other things he says: It affords me much gratification to report that the wholesale killing of ducks in the breeding grounds of Southeastern Oregon has been almost entirely stopped. The enforcement of the law has been especially effective in the Klamath lake and Lost river districts, where Deputy Warden Applegate has been in charge. Through his energy the transportation of ducks from these lakes out of the state has been stopped and the killing restricted to the limitations of the law. This traffic reached large proportions in past years. The English partridge is the latest accession to Oregon's game resources. These birds are doing nicely. Farmers are giving them protection. Broods of from 10 to 16 were seen in various localities early in the summer, and in a single field near Albany 75 were counted in one day. By the time the law permits the killing of these birds there is little question that they will divide honors with the Mongolian pheasant.

Homer Davenport, the well-known cartoonist and pheasant fancier, has promised to send a pair or two of Reeves pheasants, and they will be sent to Miss Griffith's pheasant farm, where they will be kept until a few broods are hatched and the young are large enough to turn loose.

Sage hens are getting scarcer each year, and their complete extinction cannot be a matter of more than a few years. The coyote has much to do with this fact.

Wild turkeys are among Oregon's youngest game wards; and while not much is heard from them, reports are that they are increasing, though slowly.

### HERB AND THERE.

The English Liberals are committed to a home-rule policy. Secretary Root favors disposing of Government transports on the Pacific coast. Good progress is being made on United States military telegraph systems in Alaska.

Cuba having elected Senor Paines as its president, there will soon come the general withdrawal of United States troops in the island, preparatory to the transfer of the control of affairs to the civil government to be installed during the coming summer.

He represents an eastern syndicate, and reports that the survey is already completed the distance of 29 miles.

The Tidings says "spotters" have been playing havoc amongst the brakemen during the past week. Several employes have already lost their positions, and more are being lost, so it is reported. These "spotters" are quite numerous, both north and south of Ashland, wending their way in either direction. These men, in the employ of the company, impersonate the noble element, and when they are successful in gaining a ride or in tipping the employes they report the occurrence. Many of the trainmen can easily spot the "spotter," and he sometimes gets ditched in a very desolate region; and, too, he takes chances on getting worse treatment.

Anthrax is causing the death of many cattle in Klamath county. State Veterinary Surgeon McLean says the disease can be stamped out by vaccinating cattle with anthrax virus. The manner in which the cattle contract the disease is by drinking water from troughs and pools in which buzzards have drunk which have fed on the dead carcasses of the diseased cattle. The work of vaccination began in November, and in all herds where the virus was used the loss at once decreased. The virus is injected into the shoulders of the company by the hypodermic needle. Two injections are made, 12 days apart. The last injection gives the animal a mild form of anthrax, from which it soon recovers. Only a few drops of the virus are required for each injection.

According to trustworthy information Dr. Kuyper, the Dutch premier, recently intimated to the Boer delegations the desirability, in view of Lord Roseberry's speech at Chesterfield, of their giving some intimation to the British government of the basis on which they would entertain peace negotiations. Dr. Kuyper pointed out the improbability of any of the great powers intervening in South Africa in the near future, and suggests that he be allowed informally to sound his friends in London in the hope of a semi-official response. The Dutch Premier accordingly met Abraham Fischer, the leader of the Boer delegates, and others at Brussels, where a long conference was held, after which Dr. Kuyper proceeded to London. The result of his visit, if any has been attained, is not yet known.

Gen. Botha has sent a note to all Boer commandos requesting them to keep on fighting, for the British parliament is to be asked for another war appropriation, which will induce the British nation to demand that the war in South Africa be stopped.

The Senate has passed Senator Mitchell's bills appropriating \$10,000 for a launch for the customs service at Astoria; appropriating \$400 for additional quarters for three keepers at Yaquina light station, and appropriating \$4500 for a new building at Cape Blanco light station.

Alaska and the United States may soon be connected with a line of wireless telegraphy. Seattle, Wash., capitalists, are negotiating with Chicago firms for equipment for the proposed line, and the promoters believe that with the opening of the summer season the line will be in operation between Nome and Seattle.

The report of the coal product of the United States for 1900 shows that the output of Oregon was 58,864 short tons, as compared to 86,888 tons in 1899. The Washington product increased from 2,029,881 tons in 1899 to 2,474,093 tons in 1900. The total output for the United States in 1900 was 260,064,281 tons, an increase of 15,324,239 tons over the year preceding. This makes the United States by far the greatest coal-producing country in the world.
