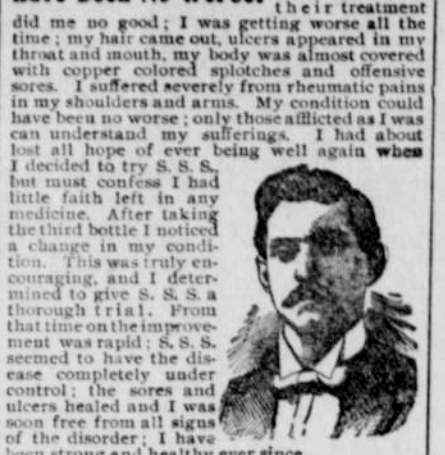

New Cuba's First President.
At her first general election, recently held, new Cuba elected Tomas Estrada Palma president of the republic of Cuba.

Tomas Estrada Palma, the descendant of a distinguished Castilian family, has been called the Franklin of Cuba.

He is sixty-five years old, was educated in Havana and became a lawyer. He eagerly took part against Spain in 1898, was chosen to the congress of the revolutionary government and in 1875 was elected president of Cuba.

Palma was captured by the Spaniards and was detained in a Spanish castle for seven years until the end of the conflict in 1870. Enduring intense hardships, Palma was offered freedom if he would swear allegiance to the Spanish crown.
"No," he answered. "You may shoot me if you will, but I will die as president of the Cuban republic."
Coming to this country, Palma opened a school for boys at Central Valley, Orange county, N. Y. During the war between the United States and Spain he was the head and front of the Cuban junta. He is intellectual, courteous and has business acumen.

Word Building.
The game of word building is played in this way: One person names a letter, which the person at his left hand is obliged to follow with another letter which could be used in forming a word, but which does not of itself complete one. The third person, also having a word in mind, adds another which helps to form a word, but does not complete one. The fourth person does likewise, and the game proceeds until some player finds that he cannot add another without forming a word. Whoever completes a word loses one of his three lives. Three lives lost banish one from the circle of the living and makes a spirit of him.

To make the plan of the game a little clearer, let us say that the first player, having in mind the word arripelago, names the letter A. Player No. 2, thinking of allabross, adds 'L'. No. 3, thinking of allure, adds another 'L'. Unfortunately for him, this addition forms the word 'all', of which he did not think, and he loses one of his three lives.

If any player is suspected of naming a letter without having a word in mind, he can be challenged. If he cannot give a word which could be formed by using the letter he named, he loses a "life." But if he can name one the player who challenges him loses a life. One by one lives are lost and players drop away, the last one winning.

A relish prized by those who have copied the idea from foreigners is slices of green peppers, the seeds removed, eaten with white bread as an appetizer.

Will Prevent Tarnishing.
Silver will not tarnish if painted over with a soft brush dipped in alcohol in which some colloid has been dissolved. The liquid dries immediately and forms a thin, transparent and invisible coating upon the silver, which prevents it tarnishing. It can be removed at any time by dipping the article in hot water.

Round Dining Tables Are Stylish.
Round dining tables are considered more stylish than the square top ones, and those having five legs, a heavier one in the center and one at each side, are much newer than the pedestal design.

HINTS FOR FARMERS

Clover as an Orchard Mulch.
Considerable publicity has been given to the remarks of W. T. Macoun of the experiment station at Ottawa, Canada, made at the American pomological meeting in discussing the renovation of apple orchards. Mr. Macoun stated that the practice at the experimental farm had been to grow clover in the orchard throughout the year. As the clover reached the blossoming stage it was cut and allowed to remain on the ground. The last growth of the clover in the autumn was not mowed, but permitted to stand as a cover during winter. This system is in effect a combination of green manuring and mulching. It differs from the ordinary cultivation and cover crop system in that cultivation is left out of the programme.

A rather too wide application of Mr. Macoun's remarks has been made. He was careful to state that this practice pertained to their own orchard and was the outgrowth of peculiar soil and climatic conditions. The subsoil of this orchard is cold and impervious. The region in which it is situated is rarely visited with protracted droughts. The object in growing the clover is to aerate the soil, draw out its surplus moisture and protect the trees from the effect of severe freezing in winter. Undoubtedly the clover mulching plan may be applied quite widely. I believe that it can be practiced with advantage in many of the colder apple growing regions, but I do not think it would be the best plan to follow in sections where rainfall during the growing season was at all uncertain. In such sections cultivation is essential.

The particular region described by Mr. Macoun is not a commercial fruit section. Apples are grown in an amateur way, and fruit of fine quality is produced, but no large areas are devoted to the industry.—Professor John Craig, Cornell University.

Something About Alfalfa.
Alfalfa is comparatively a new plant in this country, but in Asia it was known and cultivated before the dates of the most ancient history. It grew in abundance in Assyria and Persia and at an early day found its way to southern Europe, and thence with the Spanish conquerors to Mexico and Peru. It was grown to some extent, but not appreciated, in the eastern states long before it was recognized as of material value anywhere in this country. In portions of South America it has escaped from the fields and grows wild over large areas. It is now grown largely in all the arid and semiarid regions of the world and is everywhere recognized as the most valuable forage plant known for all sections where rainfall is scant. But it is by no means confined to arid sections, but is grown and esteemed where rainfall is abundant. Its most perfect development, however, seems to be where it can get sufficient moisture by means of its long taproot and does not have to depend upon rains.

Colonel Clayton McMichael, whom President Roosevelt has selected for the post nextmaster at Philadelphia, is a man of considerable belt measure. Recently he sat in a crowded street car when a number of women entered. Colonel McMichael, with his customary gallantry, arose, grabbed a strap and watched two women squeeze into the seat he had given up. "There," he said, turning to a friend, "I can do something you can't do. I can give my seat to two women."

Benches Are the Rage.
Benches here, there and everywhere are quite a craze in home furnishing just now. Where a room has no mantel and has a plain, quite good sized wall space to make a feature of a high backed bench is very fashionable and proves a very effective substitute. Have a shelf fastened on brackets above the high back of the bench for bric-a-brac, throw a rug on the floor in front of it, and with several consistently covered down cushions the result is quite charming and often saves the entire effect of a room.—Exchange.
