THE PIANO RECITAL Given by the Pupils of Mrs. E. E. Gore, Saturday.
A large and appreciative audience filled the Medford Presbyterian church Saturday evening to enjoy the recital given by Mrs. Gore's talented and ambitious pupils—Miss Agnes Love and Miss Florence DeBar. Both young ladies have achieved a degree of proficiency unusual in girls so young and rendered a program selected largely from the classics, that was indeed a musical treat. By continuing their unremitting study they should attain brilliant success as pianists.
Miss Love's numbers were: "Nardacelus," "Navi," "Spring Song," "Mendelssohn," "Sonata in G," "Bethoven" and Polonaise in C sharp minor, Chopin, in each of which she evinced an even, sympathetic touch, intelligent phrasing, and technical skill equal to the demand of the music, united with a true musical temperament. Miss DeBar gave "Fairy Fingers" by Mills with a lightness and delicacy of touch that brought out nicely the idea suggested by the title, while her deep musical feeling was evident in her interpretation of the Nocturne by Schumann. Melnotte's arrangement of Il Trovatore taxes both the technical and musical resources of the player, and it was in this number that Miss DeBar proved her high attainment as a musician.
Mrs. Gore demonstrated with a class of children ranging from four to ten years of age the practicality of kindergarten principles as applied to music study.
The pleasure of the evening was added to by vocal selections rendered by Clarence Meeker and Gore Bros. quartette and the violin solo by Miss Mary DeBar.

CRATER LAKE PARK BILL PASSES. Oregon is at last to have a National Park at Crater Lake. Just before adjournment of the U. S. Senate on May 9th Senator Mitchell called up the House bill creating this park, and secured its passage in the same form. Inasmuch as the bill was put through the House at the request of the President, there is no doubt that his signature will be affixed and the bill become a law within a few days. As the bill passed it withdraws from settlement, occupancy or sale a tract of 249 square miles, including and surrounding Crater Lake, to be known as Crater Lake National Park. The park will be under the control of the Secretary of the Interior, who will see to its protection, both from fires and trespassers. Lumbering and other enterprises are prohibited within the park, although mineral locations may be made under the law. It is alleged, however, that no minerals exist within the park. The order of Secretary Hitchcock formally withdrawing from entry the lands to be embraced in the park will follow closely the signing of the bill by the President.
