### CENTRAL POINT PLANS.

Hopes to Become Residence Section of the Valley.  
MANY IMPROVEMENTS.

Will Shortly Lay out new Town Lots, and Build a Sewer and Water Works System. Large Acreage being Planted.

With good water, surrounded by some of the largest orchards in Oregon, and the houses partly so smothered in clumps of shade trees, Central Point is both a pretty and an interesting place. It has over 400 people, a good school building which is circled by a large playground, two churches and a number of business houses. Among its enterprising business people are J. W. Merritt, I. C. Robnett, W. J. Freeman, W. M. Holmes, Frank Galloway, Dr. Jesse Hinkle, G. S. Moore, Ike Williams, Mrs. E. Pleasants, Frank Hawk, Rev. E. B. Lockhart, Dr. G. B. Cole, W. C. Leever, E. Mayer, G. B. Ross.

It is the ambition of Central Point to be the residence town of the valley. And there is no reason why that ambition will not soon be realized. One thing certain, no prettier surroundings could be found. Some day, and no distant day either, an electric belt railway will connect the towns of the valley, which will make the selections of residence a matter of individual choice.

The enterprising citizens of Central Point see the handwriting on the wall, and, in a measure, so far as they can do so, are preparing for these future events. They are figuring on putting in a water-works and a sewer system. Very shortly subdivisions will be made of tracts adjacent to the town, and ornamental shade trees will be set out to still further enhance the scenic beauty of the place. A good-sized plot is to be set aside for a common park.

About the city the same activity is observable. The Olwell Bros. are setting out one hundred additional acres in fruit, three miles north of the town. Their other orchard, containing 160 acres, with 2,000 pear trees and 10,000 apple trees, bordering the town, is already famous, both at home and abroad. In riding past the field a person could not see a prettier scene. The regular rows of trees seen at a short distance look like a waving sea of vivid green. The blackness of the ploughed soil under the trees, which is so carefully cultivated that not a spear of grass is to be seen, is deepened and made blacker still by the network of shadows cast by the trees.

A. Weeks is setting out 160 acres of fruit near the town. Some Portland parties are figuring on a 1000-acre tract for an orchard, on a more extensive scale than ever before attempted. W. C. Leever is planting additional acreage on the Old Homestead place. It is to illustrate the advantage of high land for fruit. L. E. Van Vleet is setting out 10,000 prune and apple trees on the hill slope. A remarkable instance of the producing powers of the fruit belt around Central Point is the fact that this year is the fifth consecutive crop year for 11-year old trees, with a big crop every year. Fruit men claim there is no danger of frost to old trees. As an instance of what can be done with fruit W. H. Norcross last year received \$870 for the fruit of one acre.

A substratum of clay underlies a wide belt of the rich soil surrounding Central Point, which makes the best fruit land. This bed of clay and gravel, through which the water from the side seeps, makes the latter pure and cool.
