AROUND GOLD HILL

Activity in the Tributary Mining Districts.

NEW ELECTRIC PLANT

City Will Be Soon Lighted With Electricity.—Gold Hill an Ideal place in Which to Live.

Gold Hill was well named. There are six quartz mills within a radius of five miles of the town. The queer hills piled up around the town, cover large bodies of rich ore and a good-sized army of men are burrowing in their sides after the precious metal. Stock raising and farming are blended with the mineral resources of the town, giving it a decided advantage over most mining towns.

J. J. Houck is now installing an electric light plant. The place already has a good water plant, being supplied with pure, cold water from Rogue river, with a pressure of 204 feet. It has fine drainage and is healthful; in fact a good summer resort, for the pine trees which clothe the surrounding hills run down into the edge of the town waving forth their sweet incense, and thus keeping the air pure. The flashing blue waters of the Rogue river sparkle past the place with a music all their own, and wind away from sight among pine-clad hills that are piled up in all kinds of curious shapes. In the water depths lurk some of the finest trout that ever bent the rod of a fisherman.

There is a charm about the place that is indescribable. The scenery in places is almost wild. Big buttresses of rocks abruptly shelve from the hills, their base hidden by trees which gently slope on the other side into fertile valleys below. Between the peaks one gets glimpses of pleasing little dells and once in awhile the hill sides are plastered with green squares which show where farms have been cut from the timber.

The town itself has a population of about 300, counting many who work in the surrounding hills and practically live inside of the limits. There is a good school of three departments, a union hall for speaking and church services and a number of business firms which keep large stocks of goods.

In one article it is not possible to mention all of the mines and prospects in the district; but some of the most important might be mentioned as showing the extent of the mining interests. On Sardine creek J. H. Beeman has a 5-stamp mill in full operation, taking out the ore with which to run it as he continues developing. G. W. Lane has a fine prospect which is said to have been bonded last week for \$10,000 to a former expert of Marcus Daly. Captain Leavenworth has almost completed a new 5-stamp mill on a prospect, which gives first-class values. Dr. Ray is developing the Braden mine, the old Gold Hill property, which has a 10-stamp mill. Big sums have been taken out of this mine in the past.

The Kubli Bros., on Gall's creek, have a 2 stamp mill on their property. Above them is the Bill Nye mine, being managed by Major Andrus. Adjoining that is the Bliss mine, under the charge of Knapp of Portland. It has a good body of ore. Another promising property on Gall's creek is the claim being worked by Coffin. At the present time it is showing up well.

On Fooths creek Harth & Ryan have a good property with ore running from \$40 to \$50 to the ton. Near that is a good claim operated by P. Robinson, which shows values of \$30 and \$40. In that same district is the Dixie Queen, which is showing up good ore under the able direction of J. Fitzgibbon and son.

The same activity is observable along Kane creek. The Roaring Gilet, operated by Mendenhall is shipping gold right along. In one lot he shipped 20 pounds. The workmen are still working in good ore with every indication that it will last. E. E. Miner has an excellent looking prospect in that vicinity.

Braden & Graham are taking out some good ore in Blackwell district. It is very rich and gives promise of making the property a large producer. The "Old Johnson" mine in the same district is showing up good ore at a considerable depth under management of W. J.

The Gold Hill Power & Developing Co. is operating on the Bowden mine on a large scale. Workmen have attained a depth of 160 feet and have machinery capable of sinking 200 feet deeper. They are working in good ore and milling it as fast as it is taken out.

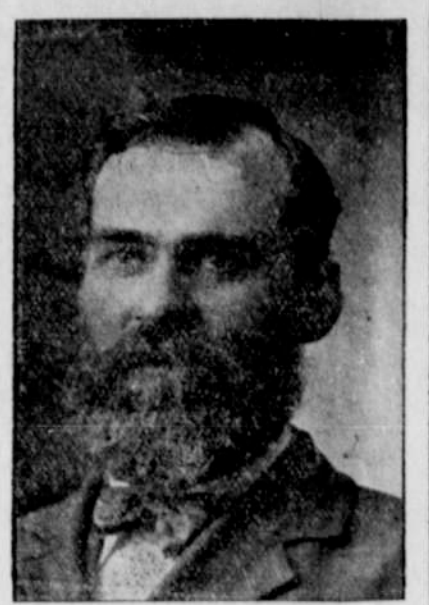
W. L. McClure is working a force of men close to town, driving a lower tunnel to tap his ledge at a depth of 250 feet. The ore body is large and goes \$25 to the ton in the upper tunnel.

There are many other prospects in the Gold Hill district of a promising nature, besides some large placer interests of which no mention has been made.
