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A GREAT DEMOCRATIC VICTORY.



Chamberlain is Elected Governor of Oregon. JACKSON COUNTY IS REDEEMED.

What the Democrats can do when they get together and nominate a first-class ticket was very well exemplified at the polls last Monday. They have elected their candidate for governor, and in Jackson county captured seven of the eleven officers balloted for.

Chamberlain's majority in this county is about 150, and his election is conceded by at least 300 votes. He had a Republican plurality of 10,000 to overcome, and that he did it reflects the greatest credit on him.

Joe Rader, the Democratic nominee for sheriff, has received the greatest majority of any of the candidates. It may reach 400. The revolt against the third-term idea had much to do with Sheriff Orme's defeat.

The result on state senator is the closest. It seems as if Carter has about 50 plurality. Neil would have been elected had not the opinion prevailed that he was a Prohibitionist.

The majorities of the balance of the successful candidates are approximately as follows: Olwell, representative, 250; Cantrall, representative, 100; Orth, clerk, 250; Applegate, recorder, 175; Jones, assessor, 200; Patterson, commissioner, 250; Miller, treasurer, 150; Jones, surveyor, 350; Pickel, coroner, 150. E. V. Carter, Applegate, Patterson and G. T. Jones are the only Republicans elected.

Gus Newbury, in his great act of juggling the county-debt question, materially assisted in bringing about this result. The Democrats are very thankful for his timely appearance on the stump, which may also be said of H. V. Gates, the imported buffoon and vulgarian.

The newly-elected officers can be depended on to give the county an efficient, economical and unbiased administration. They are honorable, competent men, and will serve their constituents well.

ELECTION RETURNS.

Those Who were Elected on Both Tickets.

The Republicans concede that Chamberlain is elected governor of Oregon. He secured several hundred majority in this county.

The election returns in the hands of the DEMOCRATIC TIMES show that the Republicans have elected E. V. Carter for state senator, J. Patterson, commissioner, Carl Jones, surveyor, Jas. Hansbrough, joint representative, and Peter Applegate, recorder.
