ASHLAND vs. MEDFORD.

They Played a Good Game Before a Big Crowd at Jacksonville on Sunday Afternoon. Thorndon and Hildreth's aggregation of ball tossers, who hail from the city of Ashland, came to Jacksonville Sunday, to play a game of ball, and went home with five runs to their credit against eight rolled up by Medford's crowd. It was a fast, snappy game, and well played from start to finish. Robley of Ashland surprised the crowd by the ease with which he fanned Anderson, Dow & Co.'s people, as he is new to the twirler's box, if not to the ball. Medford came to the bat first, and Robley started the game by soaking Bros in the leg; but he was caught stealing third. Isaacs fanned and made a safe hit, but died on first, as Dow knocked an easy one to Robley, retiring the side. Engle fanned; but Sackett put out a two-bagger. Stanley passed to first, Robley popped to the infield, scoring Sackett, and Webb struck out. In the second, Morrison and McCaulay fanned and Myers was caught at first. In Ashland's half it got a base-hit, Clopper fanned and Carter scored on Stoops' single. Hammond fanned, making the score 2 to 0 in favor of Ashland. In the third both sides retired in one, two, three order. Fourth inning, Isaacs scored on an error, and Ashland retired three straight. Score, 2 to 1. In the fifth McCaulay and Myers fanned. Anderson singled but died on second, Rothermal retiring the side with an easy grounder to first. Engle went to first on an error, and Sackett followed suit, both being charged up to Bros, who made futile efforts to get them as they passed swiftly between 1st and 2d bases. Engle and Sackett scored respectively on Stanley's easy hit to Anderson and Rothermal's sacrifice. Score, 4 to 1. Things looked favorable for Ashland. In the 6th and 7th innings, 2d base was as far as any base-runner could get. In the 8th the fun commenced for Medford. Anderson singled and Rothermal got his base on an error by Clopper. Bros went out, and Anderson scored on Isaacs' single. Rothermal and Isaacs came in on a hot one for first by Dow. Morrison and McCaulay went out, retiring the side. Ashland could not tie the score, 5 to 4 in favor of Medford. In the last inning Myers got his base; but got out on third. Anderson went to first on an error. Rothermal went out. Bros put the ball over the left field fence, and chased Anderson around the bases. Isaacs singled and scored on an error, and Dow popped to first, ending the game for Medford. The best Ashland could do, notwithstanding three bases on balls, was to bring in one man, and the game ended by a score of 8 to 5. The score is as follows:
