OUTLOOK FOR FRUIT.

**Southern Oregon Promise the
Biggest Crop.**

The report of Horticultural Commissioner Carson, for the third district, comprising the counties of Douglas, Jackson, Klamath, Josephine, Coos, Curry and Lake, is in part as follows:

From a personal inspection and the best data to be had in this district the following estimate of the fruit crop to June 1 is as near the facts as it is possible to make an estimate. We have not had any extremely low temperature during the Spring to injure fruit of any kind. The bloom on all varieties was profuse; but on fertilization it will be noted that the apple and pear seemed to suffer, while the peach fertilized and set a large crop.

During the time the peach, almond, cherry and prune were in bloom the weather was warm, dry and pleasant, the honey bee was active and these varieties were properly fertilized. As the apple and pear began blooming the weather became cold and wet, and continued so during the blooming period; honey bees were not active, hence pollen was not distributed sufficiently to fertilize them, which, in my opinion, accounts for the small crop. Orchard men have sprayed much more this year than usual. At present date weather conditions are favorable to growth. The estimates to June 1 are as follows: Apples, 65; almonds, 90; pears, 25; strawberries, 100; peaches, 90; blackberries, 700; prunes, 70; raspberries, 100; cherries, 70; currants, 100.

**CAPITULIST PEARSELL
IS HELD FOR PERJURY.**

Man of Many Lawsuits Must Answer to a Charge of Giving False Testimony.

EUREKA, CAL., June 19.—C. E. Persall, one of the best-known timber land promoters on this coast, was today held by Justice of the Peace R. W. Rideout to answer to the Superior Court on a charge of perjury. The preliminary examination had lasted the greater part of a week.

The charge grew out of the civil action of B. F. Durphy vs. C. E. Persall, tried recently before Judge Wilson. It was sought to set aside an agreement made by Durphy on the ground of duress. It is alleged that in this action, which went against Persall, he swore falsely in that he said on the stand that he did not give J. N. Gillett, his attorney, the marriage certificate of B. F. Durphy and Margaret Ryan, which was used to convict Durphy in the Oregon courts of polygamy.

Persall is believed to be wealthy. He has made about \$200,000 during the last year, which he has given to his wife. His judgment creditors have endeavored to reach this fund on supplementary proceedings, but without success. Persall has been sued oftener than any other man in Humboldt county. He has three civil suits pending, and has just concluded three others, all having been decided against him.
