## LATEST DISPATCHES

### Aping Tracy.

WALLA WALLA, Wash., Aug. 19.—With bloodhounds following the scent of the two disciples of Harry Tracy a posse is close at their heels, and another battle is expected soon. Sheriff Taylor of Umatilla county and Deputy Sheriff Burke of Walla Walla county are at the head of the band that is bent upon capturing the two men who have defied the law of two states for five days. Early this morning there was a running fight a few miles west of Lowden Station, the desperadoes disappearing in the brush after exchanging shots with the sheriffs. Bloodhounds were sent for from the Washington penitentiary, and when they arrived the trail was again taken up at daylight. The robbers are known to be desperate, and it is believed they will fight doggedly when cornered. The posse expects to run them to earth before darkness tonight. There is great excitement all over the country, and farmers are on the watch for the fugitives.

### The Strikers Still Determined.

SHENANDOAH, Pa., Aug. 19.—Notwithstanding all reports to the contrary the striking miners claim that they are in better condition than ever, and will stand out to the bitter end. President Mitchell of the Mine Workers of America says: "The men are just as determined as ever to win, and will stick it out as long as necessary, so that it all depends on the action of the operators when the strike will terminate. The financial end of the strike is being kept up in a very satisfactory manner, and we have been able to relieve every case of distress. There is no doubt that we will be able to do this. There have been some shipments of soft coal into the Eastern market. There have been no shipments of anthracite coal since the strike began, and the supply of that article is now practically exhausted."

### The Chicago Murder.

CHICAGO, ILL., Aug. 19.—Developments in the Bartholin-Mitchell murder mystery has led the police to believe they are nearer the solution of the problem than at any time. Edward Counselman, the intimate friend of Wm. J. Bartholin, who was held for possible knowledge of the crimes, was taken before Justice Quinn today and held for ten days in bonds of \$10,000, charged with being accessory after the fact in the murders of Minnie Mitchell and Mrs. Anne Bartholin. Counselman admitted he had met Bartholin and that Bartholin said he was in trouble over Minnie Mitchell.

### Want to Fight for Uncle Sam.

LONDON, England, Aug. 19.—Former British soldiers, who have served against the Boers, have been applying in numbers at the U. S. Embassy for enlistment in the American army in the Philippines. They say a report was in circulation at Cape Town and Durban that the United States was enlisting ex-British soldiers for service in these islands. Scores of applicants have already been turned away greatly disappointed.

### Great Men Coming to America.

LONDON, England, Aug. 19.—The Boer generals, Botha, Dewet and Delarey, started for Brussels last night. Captain O'Donnell, who served on Dewet's staff throughout the war, starts immediately for America to prepare the way for the visit of the Generals. He says that altogether about 500 Americans and 500 Irishmen were with the Boer forces. The Generals were given a very enthusiastic reception in England.

### The Extra Session.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 19.—Talk about an extra session of Congress continues; but the officers of the Administration handle it very carefully. It is reported that the President is determined upon reciprocity with Cuba, and will force the fight for it. In consequence he may abandon the trip to the Southwest he had planned. The matter may figure largely in the Fall elections.

### President Schwab Will Retire.

LORETO, Pa., Aug. 19.—Charles M. Schwab, manager of the billion-dollar steel trust, wants to retire. He finds his duties too onerous, and fears that his illness will prove serious if he continues to transact them. Schwab receives a much larger salary than any man in the world. It is supposed to be a million dollars a year.

### Another Society Event.

NEWPORT, R. I., Aug. 19.—Fashionable society is much excited over the suicide of R. R. Remington, who was prominent among the 400. He was engaged to Miss Mary Van Allen, granddaughter of John Jacob Astor, who broke the engagement. This is given as the cause of the rash deed.

### A CAESAREAN BIRTH.

Extraordinary Operation Performed by a Physician Well Known in Southern Oregon.  
A birth occurred at The Dalles Hospital recently, which is a very unusual one in any community and the second of its kind ever known in The Dalles, and very dissimilar from the first, from the fact that the mother and child are both living.

Some weeks ago a young woman of 22 years, whose home is in the valley, came from the country to the hospital to remain until her child was born. Saturday night it became apparent to Drs. Ferguson and Reuter that the case was an unusual one, and to save the life of either mother or child they would have to resort to the Caesarean section or abdominal operation, which is extremely difficult and which the mother seldom survives. It is known as the Caesarean birth from the fact that Caesar is said to have come into the world in that manner. In those days the thought was to save the child, and in nearly every case the mother died. Our young surgeons were therefore confronted with what has baffled many an aged physician, and are therefore deeply gratified that though in a very weakened condition the mother is getting along remarkably well, and they have at least a hope of her recovery; while, were it not for the abnormal state of the child's head, there would be no doubt as to its living. But while the child, which is a boy, weighs thirteen pounds much of its weight is due to the size of his head, which measures 21 inches, the average size for a boy of 15 years, infants' heads usually measuring 13 inches. Water on the brain or hydrocephalus is said to be the trouble. Otherwise the body of the child is normal or perhaps under size. We have heard much said in praise of physicians who have successfully performed a similar operation, and congratulate Drs. Ferguson and Reuter on the new laurels which they certainly have won in this difficult case.—[The Dalles Chronicle.]
