NOTICE, SHEEPMEN.

The attention of sheepmen is called to section 3365 of the laws of Oregon, which is as follows:
"Any person or persons owning or having under their control sheep or bands of sheep which have become infected with scab or other contagious disease for a period of fifteen days without reporting the same be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and punished by a fine not less than \$25.00, or more than \$250."
Any person having sheep in Jackson county is notified that this section of the statute will be strictly enforced.

FRUIT SHIPMENTS

From Southern Oregon Have Commenced—They Will be Large.
J. A. Whitman, the enterprising producer and shipper of fruit, has a small force of men employed in packing pears and early apples. He has already sold a few carloads of the former for shipment to St. Louis.
Bartlett pears are now in condition for shipment. Many are engaged in picking them, and the orchards in this vicinity present an animated appearance. The price offered for this fruit is not as good as it was last year, and fluctuates considerably. The best price offered in Chicago now is \$1.70 per hundred pounds, although it has been both higher and lower this season. Some shippers got more than \$3 per hundred during 1901.

LABOR DAY

Should and Will be Generally Observed in Oregon.
The first Labor Day proclamation ever issued in the State of Oregon was sent out by Governor Geer, to-wit: "Whereas, the legislature of Oregon has set apart the first Monday in September of each year as a legal holiday, to be known as Labor Day. Therefore I, T. T. Geer, governor of said state, do hereby recommend that all places of business of whatsoever kind, as far as possible, be closed on Monday, September 1, 1902, and that the day be devoted to an observance of such exercises as may contribute to a better understanding between labor and capital, the great moving forces behind modern industrial development; and it is especially urged that employers cooperate with their employees in a mutual observance of the day in such a manner as will fittingly recognize the reliance which each must place upon the other before the best results from both may be expected or attained. In testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand and caused the Great Seal of the State of Oregon to be affixed hereto. Done at the capitol, in the City of Salem, this 13th day of August, A. D. 1902."

AWARDED DAMAGES.

F. M. Wade Gets a Big Judgment Against a Bank.
A recent Tacoma dispatch states that in the case of F. M. Wade, (who is well known in Southern Oregon) against Chester Thorn and the National Bank of Commerce, of that city, which occupied a whole week in the United States circuit court, the jury returned a verdict of \$36,500 in favor of Wade.
The suit was brought by Wade for the malicious prosecution of a civil action brought by said bank against Wade, McClaine and Weathered, in 1895, and after running in the United States court for over four years was dismissed by the bank. That suit charged Wade and the other two of bad management of the bank's affairs while Wade was its president and McClaine its cashier. The action just decided is for Wade's damages on account of that suit.

ROBBERY COMMITTED

At Gold Hill—No Clue to the Perpetrator as Yet.
Some unknown party entered the residence of Hon. W. A. Carter of Gold Hill last Friday night, while he and his wife were at Grant's Pass. Among the articles taken were some articles of wearing apparel and jewelry belonging to Mrs. C., and an open-faced watch, all of the value of a few hundred dollars. The robber entered the house through a screened window. Evidently he or she was aware of the proprietor's absence, and perhaps more or less acquainted with the premises. A young woman living in Gold Hill with her sister was suspicious of the crime and arrested; but as nothing could be found to criminate her she was released. The guilty party may yet be arrested, as officers are on the lookout.
