Oregon Fruit Growers.

At Portland, Jan. 16th, the State Horticultural Society concluded its annual session. It adopted various resolutions, among them one inviting the American Pomological Society to meet there in 1905, and one that the committee on legislation be requested to take steps looking to the appropriation by the State of means to secure ample competitive displays of horticultural products at the regular meetings of the society. Prof. Cordley was asked to investigate the matter of checking the apple scab in the Willamette valley. The newly elected officers are: President, J. R. Cardwell of Portland, re-elected for the 14th time; first vice-president, I. M. Gilbert of Salem; second vice-president, J. D. Owell of Central Point; secretary-treasurer, Prof. E. R. Lake of the agricultural college, Corvallis, re-elected for the 10th time; third member of finance committee, Col. H. H. Hagner of Forest Grove.

That Southern Oregon will have a league composed of teams representing its different towns seems probable. A meeting of parties interested in this matter was held in Medford Sunday and the preliminaries partially arranged. All the larger towns were represented, excepting Grant's Pass, Taylor; Jacksonville, M. M. Taylor; Medford, I. Humason, J. A. Whitman; Ashland, Wm. Helen, E. A. Hill, et al. J. E. Egan of the four towns will have a director in the league, who will elect its officers. Twelve hundred dollars of the stock has already been subscribed, and this subscription can doubtless be completed. No other way than by the formation of a circuit can first-class base-ball contests be secured, and we hope that it will be formed.
