Circuit court for Josephine county convenes on Monday, April 20th.

President Roosevelt has an Italian professor engaged to give him fencing lessons.

Oregon mills cut 935,345,319 feet of lumber and 32,265,000 shingles during the year of 1902.

The 1903 product for Oregon is 20,000,000 pounds of wool, with rates about the same as that of last year—20 cents.

The American Mining Code, standard authority on all subjects pertaining to mining, water-rights, etc., is kept on hand at this office.

The prevailing wages in the Cape Nome mining district is \$5 a day in the summer and \$3 during the winter months.

The Review says a new surveying crew will shortly be put to work on the Roseburg-Croos Bay branch of the Oregon Central.

The county court of Josephine county has a pre-arranged \$300 toward completion of the wagon road from Leland to the Mt. Reuben mines.

The sheriff and district attorney of Siskiyou county, Calif., have given notice to saloons throughout the county that running of percentage games will not be tolerated.

In the counties of Douglas, Coos, Curry, Josephine and Klamath there are 12,519 square miles of timber. Roughly estimated, this will make 75,414,000,000 feet of lumber, board measure. The timber is principally Douglas fir and sugar pine.

Portland, Or., merchants have been receiving short-weight butter from San Francisco, recently, all of which was sent back by Food and Dairy Commissioner Bailey. The rolls when weighed were found to be from 1 1/2 to 1 1/4 ounces under two pounds each.

George Estes, president of the American Association of Railway Employees, has been discharged from custody and the charge against him dismissed. This has a tendency to confirm the suspicion that has all along existed that Mr. Estes was arrested wholly to prevent his exerting his influence in behalf of the strikers. The charge placed against him by the Pacific Mail Co. was inciting labor troubles.

The Guard is informed that Eugene bidders for transportation and conveyance supplies for the Mazamas, who were to go there on July 9th and make a trip to the Three Sisters, have not made suitable figures, and there is a likelihood of the expedition being declared off.
