Everything Will be Taxed Hereafter.

With the taking effect of a act passed by the last legislature everybody must hereafter pay taxes, and there will be no longer any such distinction as taxpayers and non-taxpayers.

Everybody will in future be qualified to vote at school elections, or join the taxpayers' league, and there will be no such thing as a man being excused from jury duty because he is not a taxpayer.

Under the statute concerning exemptions, as amended, all personal property is subject to taxation. Nothing is exempt. Even a man's dog, which, according to law, is personal property, can be assessed.

Among other things done by the late Oregon legislature was to raise the cost of a marriage license. Probably it's a good thing—for the girls. After May 20th the price of a license will be raised a dollar.

Among other laws enacted is one that requires clerks and other county officials to answer garnishments. This is a repeal of the former law regarding this matter.
