



Tue decisions of the land department have been so liberal as to lead settlers to b lieve that all that is required is to e tablish only a constructive residence; that to put up any kind of a | weight. building, cultivate a few acres of land. and visit the land, sleeping thereon once in six months, sufficed to establish a residence. However, this is not a compliance with the law, nor is it liable to be so considered by the department. The intention of the homestead law is to give actual set tlers homes, not to give every inspeculation. It is the purpose of the government to give every settler who this week. will go onto a piece of land, cultivate and improve and make a home thereon a title to 160 acres. It is expected that such settler shall make his homestead his actual home; that he shall reside there the majority of the time, not live somewhere else, and visit his homestead semi-occasionally. The law provides that he shall not be absent from his homestead longer than six months at any one time. This does not contemplate that he shall be absent from the homestead the greater part of every six months during the five years' residence, but that he shall

actually reside upon the land the greater portion of the time. At present the government is keeping a rigid watch over the homesteads of Oregon and Washington. Every proof that is submitted will be carefully scrutinized, and lack of residence is liable to deprive many of their right to obtain title. It is indeed questionable if those who have e tablished only constructive residence up in homesteads-that is those whi live in town 360 days in the year and stroyed by fire.
