

Old Orchards and New.

I will say right here in regard to that sod method there may come a time when it is proper, if your trees are very thrifty, to put the orchard in sod for two or three years for the sake of checking its growth and to make the

trees fruit. But if kept in sod a long time the trees will pay the penalty. Next year I am going to take a block of apple trees that are twelve or thirteen years old, plow them in the spring and sow them with cowpeas, let that go down and do the same thing the next year. In that way I think I can keep up the fertility of the land and grow good fruit. It is not thought good to plant an orchard where you have taken one out. I have two peach orchards growing, one three years old that I put right back after taking an old peach orchard out. I took care to put lots of cowpeas on the ground, and the milk during the first eight months I can tell you of my failure or success following calving was \$184.80 in favor




