Cleveland M. Donkel was acquitted by the circuit court for Crook county of the murder of his father, Simon P. Donkel. The verdict was returned after several hours of deliberation. The murder was most revolting. After killing the aged man, the perpetrator of the crime buried the body near his camp in the woods. The son discovered the grave and notified the authorities. His strange suspicion at the time directed attention against him and he was arrested, and his trial followed.

The annual report of W. S. Shallenberger, second assistant postmaster-general, shows that the annual rate of expenditure for all classes of mail transportation service in this county is \$63,954.52, and that the rate of cost a mile traveled is \$12.89. During the year there were 373 casualties to mail cars, in which 13 clerks and 4 other employees were killed, 78 clerks seriously and 388 slightly injured. Owing to the large increase in the postal business Congress is urged to authorize 300 additional railway postal clerks.

CAR STRIKE ON THREE THOUSAND CAR MEN ARE INVOLVED.

Chicago, Nov. 12.—The long-expected struggle between the union employees of the Chicago City Railway and the company is on, and when the residents of the Southwest sides of the city started for their places of business they were without their usual transportation facilities.

Beginning at midnight the trainmen gradually took their cars to the seven barns of the company and left them there. In the shops, barns and power houses the union workers laid down their tools and quit, declaring that they would remain idle until the company consents to arbitrate the issue that brought on the controversy.

The strike was ordered at a mass meeting of conductors, motormen and gripmen with only four dissenting votes. About 3000 employees are involved and 230 miles of surface track, part cable and part electric.

Officials of the union, fearing that the interference with the operation of the United States mail service will result in calling in troops from Fort Sheridan to protect the cars, instructed motormen on mail cars to report for duty as usual.

Union men who reported at the various barns to take out mail cars were told by the barn bosses, it is said, that they must take of their union buttons if they intended to work. This a number refused to do.

At the barn at Thirty-ninth and State streets the strikers distributed buttons to would-be passengers hearing of the strike, and the legend: "Stand for principle; I will walk."

It was momentarily expected that her masts would crack asunder and the vessel turn bottom up and go to pieces.

New York, Nov. 12.—Many Bogota liberals and conservatives are calling here regarding the secession of the isthmus, says a Herald dispatch from Panama. Everything is promised the isthmus to induce them to return to the general country. Far more than Panama is dreamed of is now freely offered if the new republic will give up the movement. Even "eternal heavenly happiness" was promised in one dispatch from a high authority at Bogota. It is needless to say that the appeals have been ignored, and there is not the slightest possibility that the new republic, which is now so firmly established, will listen to any overtures from Bogota.
