The husband had become insanely jealous, caused by his wife allowing a young man to kiss her while playing a game of forfeits at a party in the country where Brown was teaching school.

The request sent out from St. Louis through the Associated Press by the Louisiana Purchase Exposition management, that exhibitors forward their displays at the earliest possible moment, is very timely and should meet with a favorable response.

Under the most favorable circumstances there will be expediting delays in unpacking and installing exhibits. Those who visited the world's fair in Chicago in 1893 early in its existence remember that at the opening of the fair probably 50 per cent of the exhibits were either packed away in warehouses or in transit.

In the neighborhood of 8000 acres of land, included in the proposed forest reservation of Northern California, which were withdrawn from public entry last year, have again been thrown open for entry. The official notices to that effect has been received by officers of the Redding land office from the Department of the Interior.

Suit for a divorce has been filed in the circuit court for Multnomah county by David B. Carr against Sarah Carr. The litigants were married at Grants Pass in August, 1897, and Carr alleges that his wife deserted him at Galice Creek in May, 1903. There is one child four years old, of which the father asks the custody.

The administration building of the S. O. S. N. Co., which was quite recently completed, on Friday evening was formally dedicated. It is a handsome and commodious structure, and adds much to the appearance of Ashland. Short addresses were made by President Mulkey, Senator Carter and H. C. Kinney, R. P. Nell and F. H. Carter, who are members of the board of regents.

Channey Nya, a member of Oregon's first legislature and one of the earliest and best-known Southern Oregon pioneers, died at his home in Plouffe Rock precinct Sunday night. He was nearly 80 years of age and had lived in Jackson county more than half a century. He was a good citizen and highly respected by all who knew him.

Want Another Mail. A petition, with a large number of signers and backed by several prominent men of the state, has been forwarded to the Post Office Department at Washington, asking that a morning mail be established between Jacksonville and Medford, in addition to the noon and evening mails. A morning mail and train will be a great convenience to the residents of Jacksonville and to all those who wish to transact business at the county-seat. The service will give the people of Applegate their mail a day earlier than under the present order of things. The stages leave Jacksonville before the mail arrives, and the daily papers from Portland and San Francisco must lie there until the following day.

Medford Should Do Likewise. The Jacksonville Board of Trade has undertaken to secure the building of a mile of macadam road on that section of the Jacksonville-Medford road from the town to the junction of the Medford-Central Point roads. A 20-foot wide turnpike will be thrown up, the material for which will be gravel from Jackson creek, the channel of which adjoins this road. In removing the gravel for the road a straight, deep channel will be made for the creek, to prevent floods from injuring the railway, as has been done several times in the past. The improvements to the road and creek will cost about \$1000, half of which will be paid by Jackson county and the balance by the citizens and the town of Jacksonville. The committee is having no difficulty in securing the amount desired. Medford should do likewise from its end of the road.

Mining Prospects Good.

Dr. Jones and Chas. Strang, who own a fine placer proposition in Grave creek district, Josephine county, are operating it with one of the best plants in Southern Oregon. They will set one out this week, with which to get out some and other necessary lumber. There is an excellent prospect that their enterprise will prove a remunerative one.
