### THE STATE LAW AGAINST FRUIT PESTS

It is a Misdemeanor to Permit Pests to Grow or to Ship or Sell Infected Fruit.

The following is the statute of Oregon regarding the shipment, handling and working of diseased fruits, fruit trees or hops, and at this time of year should be read and remembered by every orchardist in this State:

Section I. That it shall hereafter be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation owning or operating any nursery, fruit orchard of any kind, hop yard, flower garden or ornamental trees to throw any cuttings or prunings from any fruit trees or hop vines into any public road, highway, lane, field or other inclosure, or into any water course of any kind, but shall destroy any cuttings or prunings with fire within thirty days from the time such cuttings or prunings are made.

Section II. It shall hereafter be the duty of any person, firm or corporation owning or operating any kind of nursery, fruit orchard, hop yard, flower garden or ornamental trees, and knowing such to be infected with any kind of insects, pests or disease, to immediately spray or destroy the same in such manner as the fruit commissioner for his district may direct.

Section III. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation doing business in the State of Oregon to sell, furnish or use any material, such as Paris green, arsenic, London purple, sulphur or any spray material or compound for spraying purposes in quantities exceeding one pound, without providing with each package sold a certificate duly signed by the seller thereof guaranteeing the quality and percentage of purity of said materials.

Section IV. Any person, firm or corporation selling any of the above materials which do not conform with the certificate furnished therewith shall be deemed guilty of misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be subject to a fine of not less than twenty-five (\$25) dollars nor more than one hundred (\$100) dollars.

Section V. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to import or sell any infected or diseased fruit of any kind in the State of Oregon.

Section VI. Every person who packs or prepares for shipment to any point without the State, or who delivers or causes to be delivered to any express agent or railroad agent, or other company or corporation for shipment to any point without the State, any fruit or fruits, either fresh, cured or dried, that is infected with insects, pests or diseases injurious to trees, shrubs, plants, fruits or vegetables, is guilty of a misdemeanor.

Section VII. Any person, firm or corporation violating any of the provisions of this act shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine of not less than twenty-five (\$25) dollars nor more than one hundred (\$100) dollars.

Section VIII. It shall be the duty of the commissioner of the State Board of Horticulture of the district in which a violation of this act occurs, to present the evidence of the case to the district attorney, whose duty it shall be to prosecute any person guilty of a violation of this act. Which prosecution may be brought in any of the justice courts of this State.

### Pneumonia a Mystery.

The declaration of Dr. Arthur D. Bevan, Portland, some days ago, that there is no remedy for pneumonia, and that drugs can be of little service in its treatment, has called forth no small amount of comment from physicians in all parts of the country. Some agree and some oppose, but all substantially admit that science has done less to provide a sure treatment to relieve or cure this disease than almost any other.

It is scarcely more than a hundred years since Jenner discovered how to mitigate the horrors of smallpox by vaccination, and since then there have been discovered how to control it by quarantine, and how to almost surely prevent it by proper hygienic conditions. The ravages of yellow fever and cholera, in the presence of which the profession stood practically helpless 50 years ago, are now almost entirely and safely prevented. Specifics have been found for diphtheria, the typhoid germ has been discovered and described, and doctors know how to detect its presence before it begins to do harm and how to deal with it after its deadly work has begun. Surgery has made even more wonderful progress; but neither surgeons nor physicians yet know how to deal with pneumonia. They know it is an infectious disease; they know how its seeds are disseminated, but they do not know how to make them innocuous, nor how to control the mischief they cause once they have begun their deadly work.

Dr. Bevan has now proposed that a fund be established to promote special research for a remedy for this disease. Such a fund was established not long ago to provide for the study of scarlet fever. Not only thousands, but hundreds of thousands, are expended annually in this country and in Europe in search for the cause and cure of cancer. Dr. Bevan thinks \$400,000 or \$500,000 should be raised for the study of pneumonia and its treatment. With such a fund, separate wards might be established in various hospitals for the reception of pneumonia cases. The medical colleges might give it special attention. Particularly competent nurses might be engaged, whose assistance to the doctors would be enabled to devote themselves wholly to this particular study would be invaluable. The suggestion seems to be an excellent one.

### The Farm Telephone.

The telephone for farmers is becoming rapidly a daily necessity rather than a luxury. It enables the farmer to keep in close touch with the markets without making long trips to town. He can tell his crop to much better advantage, making far more than the cost of the telephone. For example, last year Illinois farmers were selling broom straw for \$60 a ton. The markets being raising and the manager of a farmer's telephone company called up every farmer on the line and notified him of the rise. Those farmers got \$240 a ton for their broom crop.

There are numerous other uses for the farm telephone. It acts as a fire or burglar alarm in summoning help. It calls the physician, it saves work for teams and men.

But what is of equal value, it destroys the isolation of farm life for every member of the family. One woman was discovered recently with the telephone receiver tied over her ear, while she sat at her sewing and she could overhear every call over the party line. It was with no intent of eavesdropping, but to simply break the lonesome monotony of her life that she thus keeps within hearing of her neighbors' conversation. Another, desiring to call on a neighbor and having no one to leave with the baby, put the telephone receiver beside the baby's cradle and arranged with the good-natured telephone girl at "Central" that, if she heard the baby cry over the 'phone, she would call her over the neighbor's 'phone. What is home without a telephone?

# RUSSIANS MEET WITH DEFEAT IN LAND BATTLE

Two Thousand Five Hundred of the Czar's Troops Are Slain.

Battle Occurred in Corea, Near the Yalu River.

Hurrying Troops Forward.

London, Feb. 22.—The correspondent of the Post in Chefoo says: Some divisions of Russians are proceeding to the Yalu and tens of thousands of Japanese are proceeding by forced marches from various points in Corea towards the Yalu. Troops are being hurried into Port Arthur from Lia Chang. The Japanese declare that they will take Port Arthur within two months with the fleet.

Russian Ships Menace Japan.

Kobe, Feb. 22.—Four Russian warships have been sighted off Tobishima island, on the west coast of Japan, 200 miles south of Hakodate. The vessels apparently are those which sunk the merchantman in Tanguan strait on the 11th and were reported to have returned to Vladivostok.

Indignation is rife at the reports of the brutalities committed by the Russian upon Japanese non-combatants in Manchuria. The gratifying intelligence has been received that, thanks to the representations made by the United States authorities, the brutalities are likely to cease. The indignation of the public consequently is somewhat allayed. A hundred Japanese women are waiting at Port Arthur to return to Japan.

Trying to Cut Cables.

Tokio, Feb. 22.—A Russian cruiser is reported west of Hokkaido, grasping for the island cables, which they desire to cut. News from Korea states that the Russian forces have arrived at Wiju and Anju, south of the Yalu, and are pushing steadily forward. Captain Takemochi, the Japanese naval attaché at Paris, has been appointed to command the new cruiser Nishim; Captain Oronoue has been ordered to the Kasuga. The latter has steamed to Korea. Her equipment will be completed in a fortnight. The Nishim will be equipped in a month. Japanese Trying to Land Troops.

Paris, Feb. 22.—Bourdon, the Japanese special correspondent at St. Petersburg, has obtained a statement from a high Russian official of the situation in the east. The official states that the Japanese almost daily are attempting to land troops north and east of Port Arthur, with the evident intention of cutting the railway and besieging the town. The Japanese already have landed 20,000 men at Chemulpo and are landing others on the eastern coast of Korea.

Russians on the Defense.

Chefoo, Feb. 22.—The Russian forces in Manchuria are so far acting on the defensive. Extensive preparations are being made at Dalgai, Port Arthur, Newchang and Liao Yang to prevent the threatened landing of the Japanese troops. A big force of men is at work on the damaged vessels in Port Arthur harbor and efforts are being made to raise the battleship Rurik.

Demand Gunboat's Expulsion.

The Japanese consul, Odagiri, was ordered to demand the expulsion of the Mandjur, armed or unarmed, by the Taotai (governor of the Chinese province) and the Russian consul within twenty-four hours.

An emphatic refusal to obey the order was returned by the Mandjur's commander. He explained that he had received instructions from Ambassador Lesseur at Peking not to leave, the Chinese foreign office having agreed that the Mandjur should remain at Peking. The explanation is discredited, but the commander of the Mandjur declines to leave.

Consul Odagiri has warned the taotai that serious consequences will ensue if China deliberately permits such a flagrant breach of neutrality.

The Japanese cruiser Akitsushima remains at Wousung, cleared for action, and it is feared she will enter the harbor and sink the Mandjur.

ENGINEER ACCIDENTALLY SHOT.

Port Townsend, Wash., Feb. 22.—The accidental discharge of a rifle in the hands of Alfred Goebel, a coal passer on board the new revenue tug Arcata, while the vessel was moored at her dock at Friday Harbor, Saturday, resulted in the instant death of William L. Sayres of the engineers' force of that steamer.

### HERE AND THERE.

Willie Hoppe, the American billiard expert, has won the international championship at Paris, defeating Ving eoux and Sanchez.

During the month of January 938 applications for relief were made to the Portland board of charities, and the board paid out a total of \$939.35 for relief of the poor.

This year's student enrollment at Stanford University is 3,216, which is 145 fewer than last year, and somewhat fewer than have been enrolled any year for eight years past.

Worcester and salt recommended for horses with colic. Melt the lard and dissolve all the salt in it that it will take up, then drench the horse with it. Use about one pint at a time.

In the passing of pension bills the house of representatives established a new record Friday. Three hundred and twenty private bills of this character were passed in almost less time than it takes to tell the story.

That the Columbia Southern still has as its objective point Lakeview, and opening up the whole Southern Oregon district east of the Cascades, was confirmed by President Lytle in answer to a question from the Telegram.

General Alexieff has issued an appeal to the army and navy of Russia, in which he urges them to remain tranquil and trust to the help of the Almighty. He closes by saying "Let every man perform his task, remembering that prayers to God and his services to the Emperor are never wasted."

Albert J. Beckman, who on October 15 shot and killed Helen Kelly, at Butte, Mont., because she rejected him after accepting presents from him, was found guilty of murder in the second degree and sentenced to 99 years in prison. With the time allowance off for good behavior he will serve 54 years and nine months.

No matter what is said to the contrary, there is a great difference in the flavoring of an egg. Eggs laid by an active, healthy hen, supplied with good, fresh food, are much finer in flavor, color and smell and taste than those that are laid by hens that are the common scavengers of alleys, back yards and pigpens.

Doc Sperry 2:09, the pacing gelding by Altamont that Monroe Salisbury campaigned and gave his record in 1894, dropped dead from heart disease on the snow path at Brockton, Mass., February 21. The old fellow was being jogged on the snow when he suddenly faltered and fell dead. Doc Sperry won four or five big purses for Mr. Salisbury in 1894.

One-third of all the workers in this country are engaged in agricultural pursuits, 10,438,000 of them, while all other industries employ only 18,855,000. The total farm area in the United States is 841,000,000 acres, an area larger than England, Scotland, Wales, France, Germany, Austria, Spain, Japan and the Transvaal.

A dispatch from Sydney says Dowle is being given lively receptions in Australia. Rowdy scenes characterized his meeting, culminating in the breaking up of the service. Dowle escaped the mob in a cab and was pursued to his hotel by a howling crowd of five thousand. The police were unable to check the mob and assisted Dowle to escape through the back door.

The Oregon State Fair has changed the classes of the big stakes that provided so popular with horsemen last year. Instead of giving \$2000 for trotters of the 2:17 class, this sum is offered for the 2:17 class, and \$2000 is given for the 2:15 class pacers instead of the 2:17 class as last year. The 2:12 class trotters are offered \$1000 and the 2:11 class pacers are offered the same amount. The association also offers \$500 for three-year-old trotters and \$500 for three-year-old pacers. These comprise the early closing harness stakes, which are to close May 10th.
