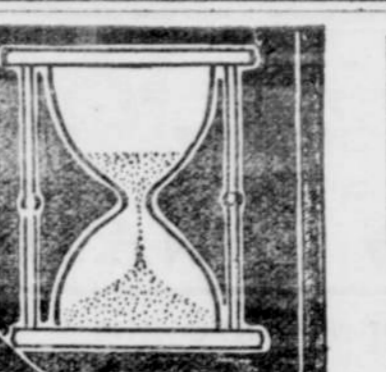

EVILS MUST BE PRACTICALLY REFORMED.

Mayor Boyd, of Spokane, has defied the preachers' reform committee by ordering the acting chief of police to return the low women, driven out by the recent curfew, to their usual haunts in the alley districts. The mayor has followed this up by directing the corporation counsel not to issue any more warrants for resort owners. He claims that the recent action of the moral element in that city has not, in the least, abated the social evil; but has simply scattered it so that it has encroached upon the home precincts and respectable portions of Spokane. Mr. Boyd says that it is less pernicious to all, and especially the young, to confine these creatures to the narrow limits of back alleys, than to allow them to spread over the municipality and occupy buildings in the immediate neighborhood of the homes of reputable families. It is somewhat similar to the quarantine against smallpox or other infectious or contagious diseases, and is the plan adopted by some of the best regulated cities in the United States and Europe.

The only solution of this and similar questions that will be reformatory is a practical one, that will view conditions as they exist and not use as a basis any Utopian view of society as it should be. There can be no doubt that the preachers and others who inaugurated the movement in Spokane were actuated by the most commendable motives; but the results of their efforts has been the scattering of a disreputable class all over the city, who have even gone so far as to employ solicitors to distribute cards among the young and susceptible. This spreading the contagion, and we believe the practical ideas of Mayor Boyd will be more effective in restricting the evil. Theories are good for such of room and moral assemblies; but in grappling with the knotty problems of everyday life practical experience and present existing conditions of society have to be called into operation.

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Republican Co. Convention.

The Republicans of Jackson county will hold two conventions this year. The first one, which will be for the purpose of electing twelve delegates to the Republican Congressional and State conventions, will meet at Ashland Saturday, April 9th, with primaries in the several precincts April 21. The second or county nominating convention will be held four weeks later, on Friday, May 14, at Gold Hill, to place a county ticket in the field. Primaries to be held Saturday, April 30th. Separate primaries may be held to elect delegates to these conventions or in the discretion of precinct committees delegates to both conventions may be chosen at one primary.

The apportionment to the conventions is identical, and is based on the vote cast for W. J. Furnish for Governor in 1902, being two delegates at large for each precinct and the new precinct of South Jacksonville, a delegate for each 25 votes or major fraction thereof. This apportionment provides for a total of 133 delegates, as follows:

East Ashland, 7; South Ashland, 7; West Ashland, 6; Duane, 5; Barron, 3; Talent, 5; Phoenix, 5; East Medford, 6; West Medford, 6; Jacksonville, 6; South Jacksonville, 2; Union, 4; Central Point, 4; Gold Hill, 5; Rock Point, 3; Eagle Point, 5; Woodville, 3; Applegate, 4; Sterling, 3; Trail, 3; Clifton, 3; Big Butte, 3; Peach Bluff, 3; Sims Valley, 3; Meadows, 3; Foots Creek, 3; Lake Creek, 3; Pleasant Creek, 3; Romy, 3; Watkins, 3; Florence Creek, 2; Table Rock, 2; Willow Springs, 3; Mound, 3. Total, 133.

Proxies in both conventions are to be confined to residents of the precincts represented, says the Tidings.

About Taxation Exemption.

The following is a copy of the last part of sec 3039, Statutes of Oregon, amended at the special session of the Legislature, in regard to exemptions of personal property.

"8. The following property, if owned by a household and in actual use, and for his or her family. Household goods, furniture and utensils; two cows, ten sheep, five swine, and the tools, implements, apparatus, team, vehicle, harness or library necessary to enable any person to carry on his trade, occupation or profession by which each person earns his or her living, to the amount of \$300, the articles to be selected by such household; provided, however, that, when the assessed valuation of the personal property above enumerated shall amount to less than \$300, then only such amount as the total of such property herein enumerated, shall be exempt from taxation."

As this bill was filed Dec. 24, 1903 without an emergency clause, it does not go into effect until March 24, 1904.
Judge Prim says that he thinks it would be proper for the assessor to allow these exemptions even though this law does not go into effect until after the next assessment began.

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Ministers in Session.

Jackson County's Ministers' Association met in Jacksonville, Monday evening, March 7th. The weather was very inclement and not all the members were present in consequence. Rev. E. A. Child presided.

After the devotional service the subject of the evening was taken up. Rev. F. G. Stranage read a good paper on "Why More Men Do Not Accept the Gospel." It gave many reasons and went over the ground very thoroughly. The discussion following was participated in by H. C. Brown, E. A. Child, W. F. Shields, Prof. Washington, James Keiso and Charles McHenry.

The discussion brought out many things that men say and show by their actions to be their reasons for not accepting the Gospel and for not attending the churches. Among those given were these: On week days and Sabbath men seek their own gratification in worldly pleasures or gains; men are accomplishing so much that they do not realize their impotence to lay hold upon eternal life; men do not see Christ lifted up; they will not come to Him that they might have life; "The mind of the flesh is enmity against God; for it is not subject to the law of God, neither indeed can it be;" and the saloon with its attendant evils.

The next meeting will be in Ashland the first Monday in May. The subject for the date is "Is the Church of Christ Inspired of the Holy Ghost, or Does the Church of Christ Speak by inspiration?" S. C. Blackwell prepares the paper and W. L. Mellinger opens the discussion. The meeting adjourned with prayer. W. F. SHIELDS, Sec.

The Oldest Man.

Noah Baby, who died recently in New Brunswick, N. S., at the ripe old age of 132, was without much doubt the oldest man and perhaps the oldest person in the country.

Tall tales are told in the South of colored men and women who "knew Massa Washington," but the age of former slaves is not always determinable. The same is true of the wrinkled mahogany Indian "princesses," who on the Pacific slope sell their photographs under their claims as coeval with the Lisbon earthquake. But Baby's age seems fairly well authenticated.

And what memories were his, or might have been! He could remember the talk of his elders of the revolutionary war while it was still the day's news in making. He was already forty when he acted a humble part in the war of 1812. He was nearly sixty when the first steam railroad was run in any country. The span of his life covered, overlapping at each end the "wonderful century."

It is a familiar observation that great ages come to the humble. Thomas Parr, of England, was a farm laborer who worked hard for far over a century, married at 120, at 150 he became "the fashion" and died two years later at the ripe old age of 192. Baby lived the most humble and quiet existence, for many of his latest years in an almshouse.
