"The British cruiser Espiegle reports that at 5:45 o'clock this morning she sighted five Japanese war ships engaging the cruiser Bayan, making for Port Arthur from the direction of the Yalu. The cruiser Askold and another cruiser issued from Port Arthur to assist the Bayan. At 6:45 o'clock the Russians got under the shelter of the forts, but the Bayan was evidently damaged, as quantities of steam were seen escaping.

"At 8 o'clock the Japanese ships opened a heavy gun fire on the forts, which did not reply, and after fifteen minutes' bombardment the Japanese retired to the eastward."


