AWFUL WORK OF TORNADO

Sixteen Persons Perish in Twin Cities--Property Loss Over Two Millions.

St. Paul, Minn., Aug. 22--Death to sixteen persons and destruction to property, both private and public, estimated in round numbers at \$1,000,000, was the result of a storm that tore down the valley of the Mississippi about 9 o'clock Saturday night from a point near the confluence of the Minnesota and Mississippi rivers, near Fort Snelling.

THE storm did great damage at St. Louis Park, a suburb about six miles from Minneapolis. The loss here is estimated at \$500,000. The tornado struck the township of Rich Valley and George Saturday night about 8 o'clock, killing four persons.

THE Western Union Telegraph office on the eleventh floor of the building at the corner of Fourth and Robert streets, was literally riddled by the wind and flying debris.
