The storm has passed and we are left unscathed. Possibly, as we are denied of the profits resulting from gigantic factories, so also are we free from the fluctuations. Probably, the lesson which our country learns is so fearful a price in former visitations wrought their effect, and we are wiser and better men. Thanks be to God, our harvests were great—our trade we have is steady; our people have abundant work; the necessities of life are cheap. We are indebted that thousands of our peasant who left our famine stricken land two years ago are threatening to return. Let them come, they will be welcome. We shall find work for all. Only too glad shall we be if in Western land they sought, and now from them, they have learned industry and prudence.

Lighting of Congress.—By an ingenious arrangement the forty-five thousand gas lights in the new hall of the House of Representatives at Washington are lighted nearly all at the same time, and without the aid of electricity. The great difficulty of lighting a vast number of burners is fully overcome by means of a continuous series of jets—forty-five thousand in number—forming, as it were, a complete net work extending over the surface of the inner sky light, and communicating one with another. The jets being applied at any point, the whole series of jets becomes ignited within the space of twenty seconds.

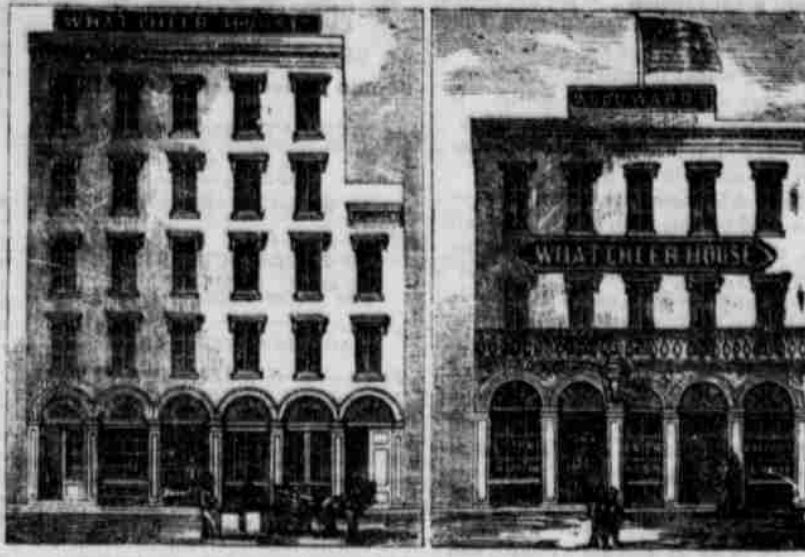
