

of public buildings, and twelve salt springs, together with seventy-two sections, are given to the State, to be disposed of in such a manner as the Legislature shall provide; and the usual percentage on the net proceeds from the sale of public lands within our limits, making in the aggregate, ninety-eight thousand five hundred and sixty acres of land, exclusive of the 16th and 38th sections; forty-five thousand and eighty acres of which is to be applied to educational purposes. Although this grant appears liberal and generous, yet, it may be difficult to find lands in any of the valleys, west of the Cascade range of mountains, of a desirable quality, unoccupied, subject to be located under the provisions of this bill.

I may be expected to say something in relation to the course I may pursue while in the discharge of the duties of the place assigned me by the partiality of my fellow-citizens.

I enter upon the discharge of the duties of the office of Governor with confidence and misgivings as to my ability to discharge the duties of so high and responsible an office in a manner to subserve and advance the best interests of the State; but, shall be governed strictly by the constitution, trusting much to the wisdom, intelligence and patriotism of the Legislature and the people, endeavoring to discharge the duties of the office faithfully, impartially and to the best of my ability for the common good of all.

I shall endeavor to keep politics as far removed from my official acts as may be consistent with the circumstances which brought about my election. It is the doctrine of all parties that the agents of the party in power should be selected from that party which is responsible for the manner in which the government is administered, and my administration will form no exception to the general rule. Much as I should regret to exercise that privilege under the constitution, wherein the Governor is clothed with a negative power on all subjects of legislation, yet I shall never shrink from the exercise of the veto power when, in my opinion, my oath, or the public good demand it.

I desire, gentlemen, at this time to offer my thanks to the people of Oregon for their confidence, as expressed by their selection of myself as the head of the executive department of the State, pledging myself against the abuse of that confidence, offering you the assurance that whatever ability I may possess shall be brought to the discharge of the duties of my position. I congratulate you on the happy and prosperous condition of our country—our people enjoy health and prosperity. Under divine providence we are blessed with abundant harvests, and it is fitting that we, at this time, commend our infant State to the protection of an all-wise being.

The bill relating to courts passed. The State tax bill was taken up, and after some debate the tax was fixed at 2 1/2 mills.

Mr. Tichenor introduced a bill to establish county seat of Curry at the mouth of Rogue River. Passed.

HOUSE.—Mr. Nelson, of Yamhill, resigned. Seat declared vacant.

The Speaker addressed the House as follows:

Gentlemen of the House of Representatives: I am gratified to know that you deserve my hearty thanks for the aid rendered me during the few days we have been in session; and I beg to be allowed to congratulate you upon the peace, harmony, and general personal kindness that has prevailed during the political contest for United States Senators. It is a source of pleasure to all, that all conflicts of political opinions have not been allowed to disturb any personal relations.

Having completed the work so absolutely necessary at the present time, we cannot but, then, part in peace; asking the blessing and protection of Providence; and that we may be permitted to meet in this Hall again on the second Monday in September next. This House stands adjourned.
