Sowing Wheat. BLOOMINGTON, PAK COUNTY, Sept. 21st, 1859. Editor FARMER: What I am going to write is founded on several years' experience in Oregon. It is on the subject of seed time and harvest of that indispensable grain of which is made the principal of our bread on the Pacific Coast. I have seen in the "Farmer," where now and then, some one writes on the subject of sowing wheat to stand over the year, and so far as I now remember, all speak of June as being the proper time to sow. I have had much experience on the subject, and differ widely from them about the time to sow. Early as 1817, I sowed some on the 15th of April. It headed considerably in the fall, and was not pastured any. The following season it was about one week earlier than fall sowing, and yielded more per acre. Since that time I have tried April, May, and June. I find May somewhat uncertain, and June extremely so, owing to the early drought which our country is very much subject to. Moreover late sowing will grow too tall and fall down, the following spring should be sown. Early sowing will not grow so tall in consequence of its heading more in the fall than late sowing. There is but one advantage in sowing late, that is, it chuses the ground better. If I could seed all I wished to in one day, my favorite time would be the 25th of April; but for fear of dry weather, I always try to commence as early as the 15th of April, and continue till done, or till the ground is too dry.

The earlier the spring, the more it will head in the fall. One spring, mine headed so early and much, that some of my neighbors laughed at me, saying that I would have my harvest in the fall; but it only made a first rate pasture, and the next summer a first rate harvest. Last spring I commenced sowing the 15th of April—the season having been early, it is not heading as I expected. My time to commence pasturing is whenever the grain is in roasting ear. Pasturing is neither beneficial or injurious to the wheat when the ground is dry. All that I pursued of my neighbors, is that I believe it will fall two head to the acre by the time the fall rains usually commence, after which time no animals should be allowed on the field.

If the ground be in good order, and sufficiently damp, and the seed regularly sown, one half bushel to the acre, at least I have always found it so. The thinner it is sown, the more it will branch, and will periah the weeds as well as if sown thick. It gets too early start the second spring to let many weeds grow among it.

No one need be alarmed about sowing early as the 15th of April, because it will not mature the first season, pastured or not. In Oregon the white wheat can be sown in the fall and kept from maturing till the second harvest, by cutting it every time it heads the first season. The second year it will ripen and mature earlier than other wheat. This it will yield three crops of hay the first summer, and one of wheat the second. I have tried the experiment once on a small piece of ground, but do not recommend it as being profitable. I merely mention it to show how the roots of white wheat can be kept alive in this country.

Spring sowing has the advantage of the fall, in several respects: First spring is generally a better time to plow than the fall. Secondly, it makes a good pasture in the fall. Thirdly, it repairs a great deal less seed. Fourthly, it is so old and hard in winter that the grass will not feed on it. Fifthly, it will not freeze out. Sixthly, it never has produced one grain of smut for me that has been found. Seventhly, if there be ice in the ground, it is necessarily destroyed by the plowing at that time of the year, and what does remain can be pulled up and removed from the field before it ripens. It is very easily pulled up.

Early sowing in the fall is also much better than late. I would as soon sow February as any time in the fall, because it is necessary to seed in the fall. Seedling in the fall should be done in September. Then if it rains early, we are sure of a good crop unless the smut spoils it, or it freezes out, or the insect injure it.
