Sowing Wheat.

BLOOMINGTON, POLK COUNTY, Sept. 21st, 1859. EDITOR FARMER :- What I am going write is founded on several years' experience in Oregon. It is on the subject of seed time and harvest of that indispensable grain of which is made the principal of our bread on the Pacific Coast. I have seen in the "Firmer," where, now and then, some one has hinted on the subject of seeding white wheat to stand over the year, and so tar as I now remember, all speak of June as being the proper time to sow. I have had much experience on the subject, and differ widely from them about the time to sow. Early as 1847, I sowed some on the 15th of

April. It headed considerably in the fall, and was not pastured any. The following season it was about one week earlier than fall seeding, and yielded more per acre. Since that time I have tried April, May, and June. I find May somewhat uncertain, and June extremely so, owing to the early drought which our country is very much subject to. Moreover late scaling will grow too tall and fall down, if the fol-lowing spring should be seasonable. Early seeding will not grow so tall in consequence of its beading more in the fall than late seeding.

There is but one advantage in sowing late,
that is, it cleans the ground better. If I could seed all I wished to in one day, my favorite time would be the 25th of April; but for fear of dry weather, I always try to commence as early as the lath of April, and continue till done, or till the ground gots too dry. The earlier the spring, the more it will head in the fall. One spring, mine headed so early

and much, that some of my neighbors laughed at me, saying that I would have my harvest in the fall; but it only made a first rate pasture, and the next summer a first rate harvest. Last spring I commenced sowing the 9th of Aprilthe season having been cool, it is not heading as much as I expected. My time to commence pasturing is whenever the grain is in roasting car. Pasturing is neither beneficial or injurious to the wheat when the ground is dry. that I pasture for, is the good of my animals I believe it will fatten two head to the acre by the time the fall rains usually commence, after which time no animals should be allowed on the field.

If the ground be in good order, and suffi-ciently damp, and the seed regularly sown, one half bushed is enough per acre, at least I have always found it so. The thinner it is sown. To Crest the more it will branch, and will perish the weeds as well as if sown thick. It gets too with the early a start the second spring to let many weeds grow among it.

No one need be alarmed about seeding early As one need be alarmed about seeding early as the 15th of April, because it will not use ture the first senson, postured or not. In Oregon the white wheat can be sown in the fall and kept from maturing till the second harvest, by entting it every time it heads the first summer. The second year it will yield and mature earlier than other wheat. Thus it will yield three crops of bay the first summer, and one of wheat the second. I have tried the experiment once on a small piece of ground, but would not recommend it as being profita-ble. I merely mention it to show how long

Early seeding in the fall is also much better than late. I would as soon chance February as any time in the fall after the 20th of October. Seeding in the fall should be done in September. Then if it rains early, we are sure of a good crop unless the smut spoils it, or it freezes out, or the geese injure it.

There is danger in a wing in August, as 't sometimes rains join enough to swell the grain and no more. Then, as soon as it is dry again, it is dead forever; and the same frequently happens to June seeding. Therefore, from some twelve years experience, I prefer September and the last of April for sowing white wheat.

per of bees some fifteen years or more, my number of hives usually varying from twenty to fifty. My occupation (teaching a small family boarding school) affords me little leisure to observe their habits, further than my immediate pecuniary interest dictates. I have, however, gradually acquired the art of man-aging them to such an extent that my neighbors, who attribute all success in bee culture to 'luck,' consider me lucky.

"As an example of my success, I give the following: In the spring of 1858, I had thirty swarms. The season proved about a medium one for honey, and the spring of 1859 found me with the same number of swarms, and \$215 50 received for honey, wax and bees of the year. I have never made any close estimate of the expense of keeping bees, but I can safely say, that at least \$200 of the above is clear profit—more than \$6 each, besides recewing the area as I mainly sweed the new awarms.
